Last Wednesday, with the Falcons missing defensive players, and their bench reduced to two attackers, the younger team was tested time and again by the Premier Division team, who have yet to be defeated in their regular competition this season.

Play was generally well-balanced, but Ideal had a slippery striker in Murques, who "ghosted" in for his hat-trick before the half, playing down the slight slope which he appeared to be well accustomed to.

The Falcons matched their opponents in terms of shots, but usually their scoring opportunities ended with the ball going over the crossbar.

In the second period, Falcons improved and finally scored with Joe Clare getting credit. But lack of cohesion in defence with the two non-

regular backs yielded another goal to their opponents. The play appeared as though it may have been offside, but there was no whistle.

Harry Jackson made a welcome return to the bench for the Falcons, and his calming influence will be felt.

He will be particularly helpful for the younger players, who are finding senior soccer pressure very evident at this level.

## For a leisurely game...

Golfers can virtually be classified into two categories.

There are those who perhaps don't consider themselves serious golfers, but enjoy getting out on the course occasionally as a mean of exercise or just relaxation.

Then there are the serious golfers who seek out courses that will present them with a stiff challenge, and tax their abilities to the limit.

Fortunately for golfers in Halton Hills, there is an excellent variety of courses in the area that will give them what they're after.

For players who aren't looking to break any course records, there are several excellent nine-hole courses within a close proximity. One is Acton Meadows, situated along the first sideway right from Highway 7, west of Acton.

Acton Meadows prides itself on being able to offer players a friendly game of golf, on what can be considered a comfortable course.

Of the approximately 150 registered members at Acton Meadows, a large percentage is comprised of a ladies' section, and a men's seniors group that plays regularly.

The layout of the course makes it particularly enticing for the seniors. There are no steep hills that can turn

a round of golf into an endurance test.

Greg Wagstaff is the manager of Acton Meadows, and has an excellent staff working with him to ensure the course and all services are well looked after.

Aside from the golf, Acton Meadows is also equipped to accommodate bookings for tournaments, wedding receptions, and Christmas parties, with expanded kitchen and bar facilities. Up to 175 people can be comfortably accommodated for virtually any such function.

Acton Meadows doesn't profess to be a "Glen Abbey" by any means. But for a friendly, leisurely game of golf, it has all the necessary ingredients.

Another area course that offers a variety of features, as well as a leisurely game of golf, is the Halton Country Inn and Club, situated on the Sixth Line, north of the Campbellville Road.

The Inn was originally the site of a hog farm operation, some 100 years ago, and the golf course was laid out in the early 1960s.

The Inn came under new management a year ago, and Brian Stojanov is manager of the facilities. He says their main concern currently is to

maintain the course at a good level for play.

But golf is only one of the many features that await visitors at the Halton Country Inn.

There is also an Olympic-length outdoor swimming pool, picnic grounds, tennis courts, and dining facilities to accommodate up to 200 people.

The grounds at the Inn provide an excellent location for company picnics, or family get-togethers, and visitors can bring their own food for an outdoor barbecue if they wish.

There is also the option of enjoying a sitdown meal in the Inn's impressive dining room, whether it's for a light lunch, or more extensive menu items.

The Inn is close to horseback riding facilities, and summer hiking trails on the adjoining conservation area lands become winter cross-country skiing trails. Kelso Beach is also a short drive from the Inn.

Larger golf courses will certainly never run out of players wishing to test their skills against a challenging layout.

But for those who prefer a light game of golf and friendly surroundings, Acton Meadows and Halton Country Inn and Club have a great deal to offer.
