The most exciting addition this year will be a craft exhibition.

Many of the talented artisans and artists from Glen Williams,

Georgetown and surrounding areas have offered their time to exhibit in the Glen. The Globe Theatre has graciously offered their premises, the former Apple Products, for the display. Frances Valentine has organized an exciting lineup.

The Georgetown Rug Hooking Guild will be showing their beautiful works for everyone to admire. Gail Spence of the Hobby Horse, certainly no stranger to Canada Day, will be demonstrating stencilling. She will be welcoming participation by the visitors. The Heritage Hand Weavers will demonstrate the age-

old art of spinning on a wheel and handloom.

Three members of the Pencil and Palette Club will be in attendance. Robert Law will show his popular pen and ink drawings. Shirley Bramley will demonstrate the techniques of oil painting while Pauline Maitland will be working in water colors.

Mary Ann Martin will display the stages of sculpturing and pottery and she will have her wheel there. A beautiful stained glass sun catcher will be made by Linda Parker and Albert Dewdney. Canada Day

visitors will have an opportunity to try weaving on Mary Simon's small loom.

Marquetry will be demonstrated by Ross Colter. He will use the texture and grains of wood veneers to create works of art. Daisy Harris will demonstrate silk flower arranging at 2 p.m. and at 4 p.m. Kim Murray of Creative Cravings will display historical wood carvings while Wendy Buykes will demonstrate one of her specialties. She will use graphite to sketch animals.

Also in attendance will be the Credit Valley Conservation Authori-

ty, the Block Parents and the Esqueping Historical Society. The Historical Society will be offering a walking tour of the village at 1:45 p.m.

All these exciting events and displays will be right near the heart of the Canada Day activities on July 1. Continuing in the family fun theme, all the events and displays will be free of charge. Be sure to bring the whole family and mark Canada's 120th birthday together.

Golfers can virtually be classified into two categories. There are those who perhaps don't consider themselves serious golfers, but enjoy getting out on the course occasionally as a mean of exercise of just relaxation.

Then there are the serious golfers who seek out courses that will present them with a stiff challenge, and tax their abilities to the limit.

Fortunately for golfers in Halton Hills, there is an excellent variety of courses in the area that will give them what they're after.

For players who aren't looking to break any course records, there are several excellent nine-hole courses within a close proximity. One is Acton Meadows, situated along the first side road right from Highway 7, west of Acton.

Acton Meadows prides itself on being able to offer players a friendly game of golf, on what can be considered a comfortable course.

Of the approximately 150 registered members at Acton Meadows, a large percentage is comprised of a ladies' section, and a men's seniors group that plays regularly.

The layout of the course makes it particularly enticing for the seniors. There are no steep hills that can turn

a round of golf into an endurance test.

Greg Wagstaff is the manager of Acton Meadows, and has an excellent staff working with him to ensure the course and all services are well looked after.

Aside from the golf, Acton Meadows is also equipped to accommodate bookings for tournaments, wedding receptions, and Christmas parties, with expanded kitchen and bar facilities. Up to 175 people can be comfortably accommodated for virtually any such function.

Acton Meadows doesn't profess to be a "Glen Abbey" by any means. But for a friendly, leisurely game of golf, it has all the necessary ingredients.

Another area course that offers a variety of features, as well as a leisurely game of golf, is the Halton Country Inn and Club, situated on the Sixth Line, north of the Campbellville Road.

The Inn was originally the site of a hog farm operation, some 100 years ago, and the golf course was laid out in the early 1960s.

The Inn came under new management a year ago, and Brian Stojanov is manager of the facilities. He says their main concern currently is to

maintain the course at a good level for play.

But golf is only one of the many features that await visitors at the Halton Country Inn.

There is also an Olympic-length outdoor swimming pool, picnic grounds, tennis courts, and dining facilities to accommodate up to 200 people.

The grounds at the Inn provide an excellent location for company picnics, or family get-togethers, and visitors can bring their own food for an outdoor barbecue if they wish.

There is also the option of enjoying a sitdown meal in the Inn's impressive dining room, whether it's for a light lunch, or more extensive menu items.

The Inn is close to horseback riding facilities, and summer hiking trails on the adjoining conservation area lands become winter cross-country skiing trails. Kelso Beach is also a short drive from the Inn.

Larger golf courses will certainly never run out of players wishing to test their skills against a challenging layout.

But for those who prefer a light game of golf and friendly surroundings, Acton Meadows and Halton Country Inn and Club have a great deal to offer.
