

Police beat

Car swerves

An Erin man received cuts and bruises following an accident at Fallbrook Trail and Clayhill Road at 11:45 p.m. June 17. Police say Jeff Longtin, 18, was driving a 1978 Mercury northbound on Fallbrook Trail when he swerved to miss an animal and struck a tree. He was treated and released from Guelph General Hospital. Damage to the car is listed at \$2,000.

Improper passing

Charges improper passing were laid following an accident between a bicycle and a motorcycle at 8:48 a.m. at Bower Street and Mill Street in Halton Hills on June 17. Police say 16-year-old Greg Wagner was riding his Raleigh bicycle southbound on Bower Street in the southbound lane when he attempted to cross the road onto the northbound lane. He was struck by a northbound motorcycle driven by a 22-year-old Hillsburgh man. The bicycle received \$300 damage and the motorcycle received \$2,000 damage. Wendy Joyce is in critical condition in the surgical intensive care unit in Sunnybrook hospital and her passenger, Saverio Angiola, 24, also of Oakville is in satisfactory condition in Peel Memorial Hospital. Damage to the car is \$8,000. Police say charges are pending.

After Friday, Saturday walkout Letter Carriers back to work

Members of Georgetown Local 154 of the Letter Carriers Union of Canada went on strike Friday morning as part of the national union's rotating strike action against Canada Post.

The 23 members of the Georgetown Local rotated on the picket lines until Saturday afternoon. The union was notified to strike at 5 a.m. Friday.

There was some support for the striking workers by friends waving and shouting to them as they drove by the post office on the corner of Maple and Guelph streets. The workers went back to work Monday.

Union local President Ron Ritchie told the Herald Monday that no mail has come through the Georgetown office since last Thursday. He has heard no word from the L.C.U.C.'s national office on how negotiations are progressing, he said.

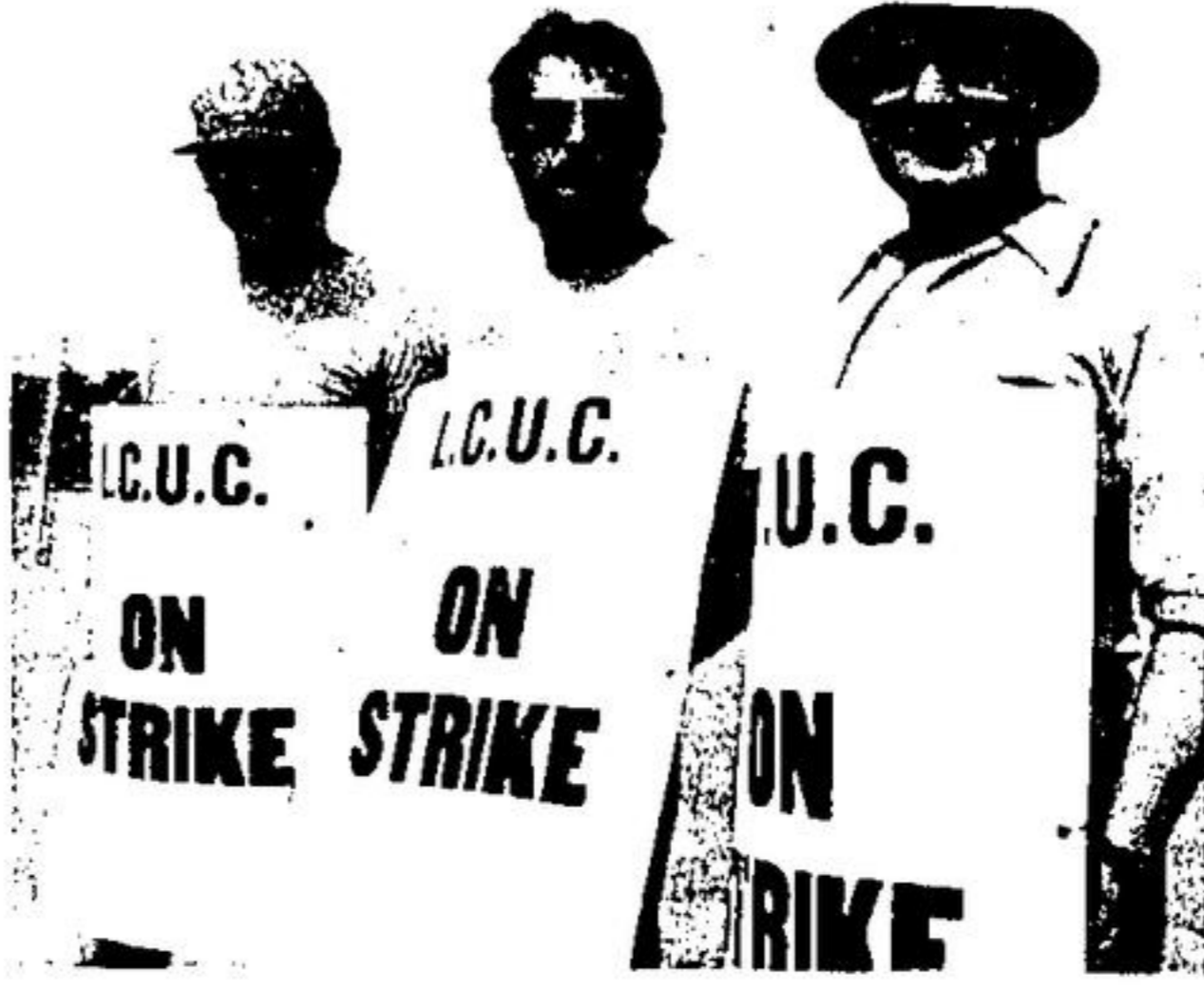
"We're still on stand-by," Mr. Ritchie said. "We're ready to go out at any time if they call us."

Mr. Ritchie added that he knew of no non-union workers being called in to move the mail in Georgetown. In Acton, the letter carriers were also out on strike but were back to work Monday.

The L.C.U.C. is asking for better work conditions and job security. A mediator has been brought in to relieve tensions on both sides and Canada Post will be recalling its non-union workers for one week.

Government agencies are making special arrangements for cheques to be dropped off during the letter carrier's strike.

Unemployment insurance cheques may be picked up at the Brampton district distribution centre in the Brampton Armouries on Queen and Chapel Streets. Bruce White at the

by Allowance and Old Age Security were mailed the first of the month. The July cheques will not be mailed until at least the middle of that month.

Halton Hills Hydro is still using the mail system for billing hydro users.

Police, Children's Aid only interested tenants

Only the police force and the Children's Aid Society are interested in sharing space with Halton Region at its Bronte Road headquarters.

The Halton Separate and Public School Boards and Halton Region Museum turned down the offer to participate in the proposed expansion.

Cramped for space for Regional staff in the "green" buildings, the Region initiated a study to meet its space needs, inviting agencies to join them.

The Thom Partnership, Architects and Planners, have designed four options for the land.

Halton Regional Police prefer the fourth option, which places the agency buildings around a grassed quadrangle.

They're concerned about the availability of land for housing the expansion, and urge Regional staff to acquire more adjacent to the current Regional property.

Land concerns are why the Halton Roman Catholic Separate School Board is dropping out of the project, according to a letter from their treasurer.

"If the province of Ontario makes additional land available to the Region and substantially more parking space becomes available, the Board might possibly renew its interest," Treasurer T.P. Brady said.

The Halton Children's Aid Society has some concerns about the size of land available for the project, but finds advantages in being grouped on the complex. For one, it is less costly.

CAS President Edith Hopkins' letter indicates preference for the Galleria Option A.

Halton Region Museum Curator Ernie Buchner is withdrawing from the complex plans, for a number of reasons. The museum originally expected Halton would have over 100 acres to work with. The anticipated 20 acres is not enough for museum needs, Mr. Buchner says in a letter to Halton.

They need lots of land to buffer the museum for safety and other reasons. The complex will draw a lot of vehicular traffic which will make the site dangerous for the many school children visiting the museum, the curator says.

Although only the police force and Children's Aid Society are interested in sharing a site with Halton Region, staff and hopeful of acquiring 8.5 more acres west of the Hydro Corridor from the Ministry of Government Services.

Regional consultants say a 20 acre site is enough for office space needs for the three organizations till 2004.

Region's second look at Milton growth study

Regional councillors decided to take another look at who should be undertaking a study on growth in Milton.

At Wednesday's council meeting, they hesitated from supporting a planning and public works committee decision that IBI Group, R.V. Anderson Associates Ltd., Simcoe Engineering Ltd., and Creative Research Group be hired for the \$185,000 first phase of the three-phase project.

Burlington Coun. Joan Little voiced her concerns about hiring this consortium, pointing out the consultants are working for Milton on the Regional landfill issue.

"We all know that will be one of the most controversial projects we'll be dealing with for years. It will have implications for all of Halton," Coun. Little said. She noted the other firms on the short list were similar in their tender bids for the project.

Burlington Coun. Pat McLaughlin said the technical reports from

Regional staff strongly favored the IBI consortium because of its extensive experience in Halton.

Milton Mayor Gordon Krantz said Regional and municipal staff were in favor of IBI, and questioned whether the "discomfort" of the Burlington councillors wasn't just a delay tactic.

Burlington Coun. Walter Mulkevic said since this will be a big issue down the road, it's best not to start it off under a cloud.

"I think we have to get off on the right foot," Burlington Coun. Joyce Savolne said.

Planning Director Rash Mohammed was asked who came in second on the short list of firms, but he wasn't able to answer.

Mr. Mohammed said IBI was the best consortium for the job although all were good in his view.

Regional Chairman Peter Pomeroy said if council and the public feel there's a conflict of interest with this consortium then it will take away from any decisions IBI may make in its study.
