All day in various rooms in the school the decade displays will bring back memories for those who attended GDHS from the pre 1930's right up to the eighties.

The official opening ceremonies kick off at 10 a.m. at the pool entrance.

Athletes can bring back their glory days once again by signing up for a basketball tournament in Gyms 1 and 2 from 10:30 to 12 noon.

The 100 years in revue plays again at 11 a.m. in John Elliott Theatre.

That famous "cafeteria lunch" can be experienced once more in the cafeteria from 1 p.m. to 2:30.

Organizers have opened a hospitality room in the shop area

from 1 p.m. to midnight.

Volleyball goes in Gyms 1 and 2 from 3 p.m. to 4:30 and anyone who hasn't caught the 100 years in revue can do so at 3 p.m.

Hungry alumni can quaff their pale ale at the barbecue dinner from 6 p.m. to 8 p.m. on the sports field.

The day ends with a bash at the pool entrance and Gyms 1 and 2 beginning at 8:30 running through to the witching hour.

Sunday's breakfast starts a half hour later (8:30) than Saturday's version.

You can mellow out in an early bird walk starting at the high school at 9 a.m.

From 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. you can take in the town's heritage on a historical town walk which also begins at the high school.

The weekend finishes with the closing ceremonies beginning at 1:30 at the pool entrance.

Fairy Lake water study

The University of Guelph got the go ahead to perform a limnological survey of Fairy Lake in Acton from town council Monday.

Such a study would determine the physical, chemical and biological make up of Fairy Lake. The study would not touch on the pollution aspect, but findings may lead to certain conclusions about pollution in the lake, said marine expert John Joyner who is associated with the University.

Mr. Joyner said University of Guelph Professor Don Stevens, of the Zoology Department would head the survey to be carried out from September to December by a class of students.

The survey would normally incur a cost of approximately \$8,500 but the university could complete the task for only \$600 - the cost of transportation of students and equipment, Mr. Joyner said.

"I hope that you see it as a major event for the region," Mr. Joyner said.

The study will determine what types of fish and other organisms inhabit Fairy Lake, he said.

"By studying the content of the lake we can give you an idea of what will happen to the lake if changes occur," he said.

Councillor Marilyn Serjeantson noted Halton Region's mandate to improve water quality may make it possible for the town to approach the region about paying the \$600.

Councillor Norm Elliot said findings from the survey may not directly include pollution content but he is concerned about the lake because of the low level of water this year and "a very disturbing noxious substance near the boathouse" last week.

Careless driver

3 way stop

The intersection of Bower Avenue and Frederick Street in Acton may soon be a three way stop.

Town councillor Rick Bonnette said Monday that "a lot of people are using Bower Avenue as a bypass. Rather than going down Main Street they're just whipping down Bower Avenue," he said.

Miller on board

Hallon Hills Mayor Russ Miller has replaced departing councillor Al Cook on the Hospital Board.

Coun. Cook resigned from the board May 27 citing closed board meetings as the reason for his resignation.

Coun. Cook called for open board meetings.

As the Mayor was approved for the position by town council Monday he was given a word of advice from Coun. Betty Fisher.

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MD's support group expected at annual hospital meeting

Members of Dr. Jack Ford's support group are preparing for Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital's Annual meeting Thursday.

Group members are hoping to discuss the board's proposed open meeting policy and to ensure newly-elected executive members support it, according to support group member Paul McDougall.

Four positions are up for election, Mr. McDougall said any member of the hospital corporation may run providing they have no relatives on staff at the hospital. Physicians at GDMH may not stand for election.

Joan Robson, another supporter of Dr. Ford, said she is hoping the hospital board will decide to open up its meetings. This will dispel the public's "negative perception" of the current board, she said.

The hospital does not have open board meetings. However, anyone with a membership in the hospital corporation can attend the annual general meeting.

Support group members do not know how many will attend the meeting being held in the Bennett Centre. Mr. McDougall said, however, this year's meeting is the first in the hospital's history that has had to be held in such a large area.

The hospital administration will not release its list of new members, Mrs. Hobson said the numbers may

reach as high as 300.

Anyone who purchased an annual membership after May 28 will not qualify to vote at the meeting. In-

dividuals may purchase life memberships for \$50 until the last minute and still qualify to vote on June 25.

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
