Friday night, they opened the tournament with a convincing 16-4 victory, but Saturday they were eliminated from further contention in the event when they dropped a 4-1 decision.

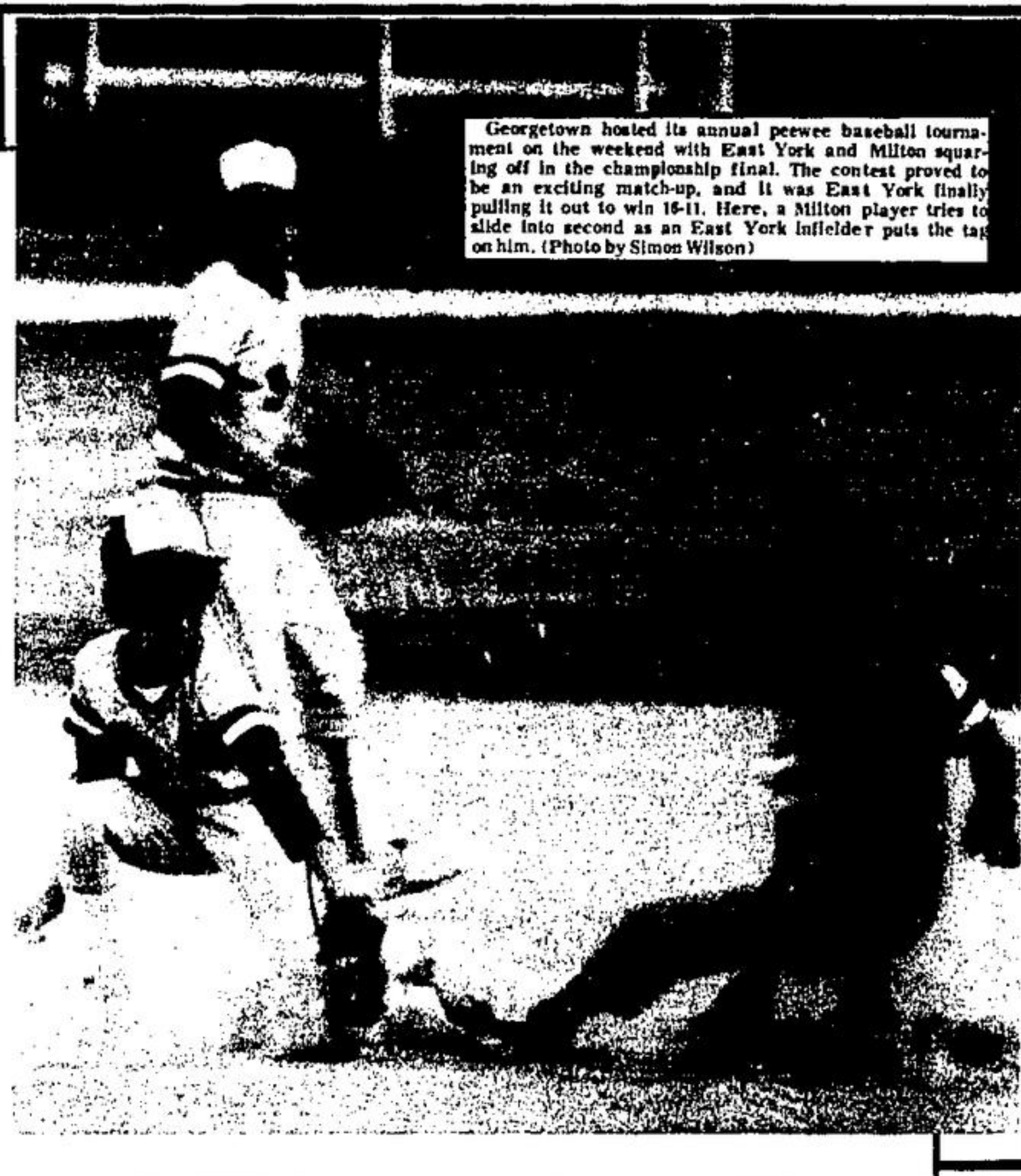
Halton Hills was scheduled to play another regular schedule game last night (Tuesday), with Shakespeare providing the opposition in Glen Williams.
