The landscape artist paints a variety of outdoor themes, but common motif is almost always in some form. There are scenes, seascapes, snowladen rivers and old farm fences in his collection. He favors no georgraphical location, pointing to works representing places in British Columbia, Nova Scotia and Saskat-

"We're hoping that with all the events that are going on in town with the reunion that it will provide more to look at," she said. Art in the Park runs from 10 a.m.
