 4. In 1900 Flora Steacie was the first G.H.S. pupil to win the Blake Scholarship in Moderns and Mathematics.

 6. These three G.H.S. students graduated from S.P.S. and went to

New York to hold important positions—Irwin Matthew, Jack Ryan, Tom Bingham.

A second Indian longhouse planned

Construction of the frame of the second longhouse at the Crawford Lake Indian Village is underway as part of the second phase of development of the most accurately dated pre-European Indian Village in the country.

The Crawford Lake Indian Village is located on the Niagara Escarpment at Guelph Line and Steeles Avenue. The entire Crawford Lake area is under the jurisdiction of the Halton Region Conservation Authority.

Fund raising to reconstruct the Iroquois Village which stood on the hill above the lake has been carried out by the volunteer members of the Halton Region Conservation Foundation.

A major archaeology dig at the village site also got underway on May 23. About half the site was excavated last summer, and the work will be completed over the next few months.

The village plan also includes the planting of wild flowers, tobacco and grass within the village centre to help create the atmosphere of a lively, well used community centre that is an important part of the Crawford Lake concept. The completed village will include a ceremony centre with trails and display areas where pots, woodwork, skins and weapons will be made during demonstrations.

A design advisory committee helping Authority staff members

recreate an authentic atmosphere includes Tom Hill of the Woodland Lake Indian Museum in Brantford; Dr. J.V. Wright of the National Museum of Man, and Dr. Bill Finlayson, the archaeologist conducting the dig on the site, and director of the Museum of Indian Archaeology.

The Foundation is in the process of raising about \$185,000 to complete the project. The entire \$610,000 Phase I to recreate the first longhouse, and build a nature interpretive centre is complete, and was about \$90,000 less than estimated costs.

Phase II involves building the remaining structures in the village, and completing the palisade and lookout areas around the longhouses. About \$60,000 of the \$331,000 needed to complete this phase must still be raised.

Phase III involves the finishing touches to the entire project at a cost of about \$125,000. Projects in Phase III range from \$1,000 to pay for interpretive plaques at the village, up to \$40,000 to complete the upper level display area in the Conservation Centre.

The Foundation is approaching various corporations and charitable foundations seeking support for specific Phase III projects.

An excellent example of community support has come from the Halton Waldorf School in Campbellville.
