Heart attack stalls dump talks

The chairman of the hearing board looking into the proposed Regional landfill site suffered a heart attack over the weekend bringing the hearings to an abrupt halt.

H. H. Lancaster will not be able to return to his duties and the remaining two board members must now decide on the appropriate course of action, said Chief Administrative Officer John Flemming.

James Kingham and Susan Tanner, both members of the Environmental Assessment Board (EAB) listened to legal counsel on Thursday to determine the best course of action.

Mr. Flemming outlined three possible routes to go. The board can continue with the two remaining members, halt the hearings altogether and start again from scratch, or adjourn the hearings for at least four weeks to appoint another chairman from the Ontario Municipal Board and give him time

to catch up on past information.

A consolidated board hearing usually means at least two different boards are represented on the panel and if the hearings continue with only FAB members they can run into difficulty.

Depending on which route the board takes, there could be major costs involved, Mr. Flemming said.

"Some parties feel proceeding without an OMB member is inadvisable," Mr. Flemming told a joint meeting of the Planning and Public Works and the Solid Waste Management Committee June 24.

If a new OMB chairman is appointed the hearing will not pick up a gain until September, he said. That would give the new chairman approximately nine weeks to study the mountains of paperwork already presented to the board.

If the board awaited a new chairman the hydrogeological evidence, already presented to the board and now awaiting cross-examination, will have to be presented again resulting in extra costs, Mr. Flemming said.

If the board starts again from scratch there could be major costs involved, he added.

The two remaining members have little experience in hearings of this type so it may be inadvisable to go that route, he explained.

"Considering the circumstances I think (appointing a new chairman) is the most reasonable and practical (route)," Mr. Flemming said.

If anyone doesn't like the result at

the end we can say, 'look we fouled up by appointing a new chairman,'" Burlington Councillor Joan Little said. "I would be very upset to see a new member come in half way through," she added.

Landfill approvals co-ordinator Susan Rogers said agreement between all parties involved is essential to appointing a new chairman.

However total agreement between all parties is unlikely, she said.

Free water hook-up thanks to council

The Glen Williams residents who were promised free water hook-up to the Regional system will now get them, the chairman of the Halton planning and public works committee said last week.

Burlington Coun. Pat McLaughlin said Chateau Belair's developers are now willing to pay for the hook-up, despite the fact the company disbanded a couple of years ago.

After an in-camera meeting with the Regional solicitor, the planning and public works committee

members agreed with an earlier recommendation to charge 1979 hook-up rates for the 12 affected homeowners.

Tut Harrison, a Wildwood Road resident who had been promised the free hook-up should development affect his well water, was present.

"Thank you very much for your consideration," Mr. Harrison said. "I know your intention is to look after the people you represent."

It was Mr. Harrison who brought the matter to the Region's attention this year, when he began having problems with his well water quality. Trying to claim the free water hook-up he had been promised by Chateau Belair, he learned the trust fund had been dissolved in 1985. Only one of the eligible homeowners had ever made a claim against it.

Car swerves

Officer charged

A Halton Regional Police officer was charged with making an unsafe lane change following an accident at Main Street and Church Street in Georgetown at 4:20 p.m. June 23. The officer was on his way to answer an alarm when he attempted to pass a 1980 Mercury on the left hand side.

The Mercury, driven by a 37-year-old Georgetown man, was making a left turn into a private driveway when the police cruiser struck it on the left side sending the Mercury into a head-on collision with a parked 1984 Pontiac. The driver and passenger of the Mercury received minimal injuries. Damage to the cruiser is \$600 while the Mercury received \$1,500 and the Pontiac received \$200 damage.
