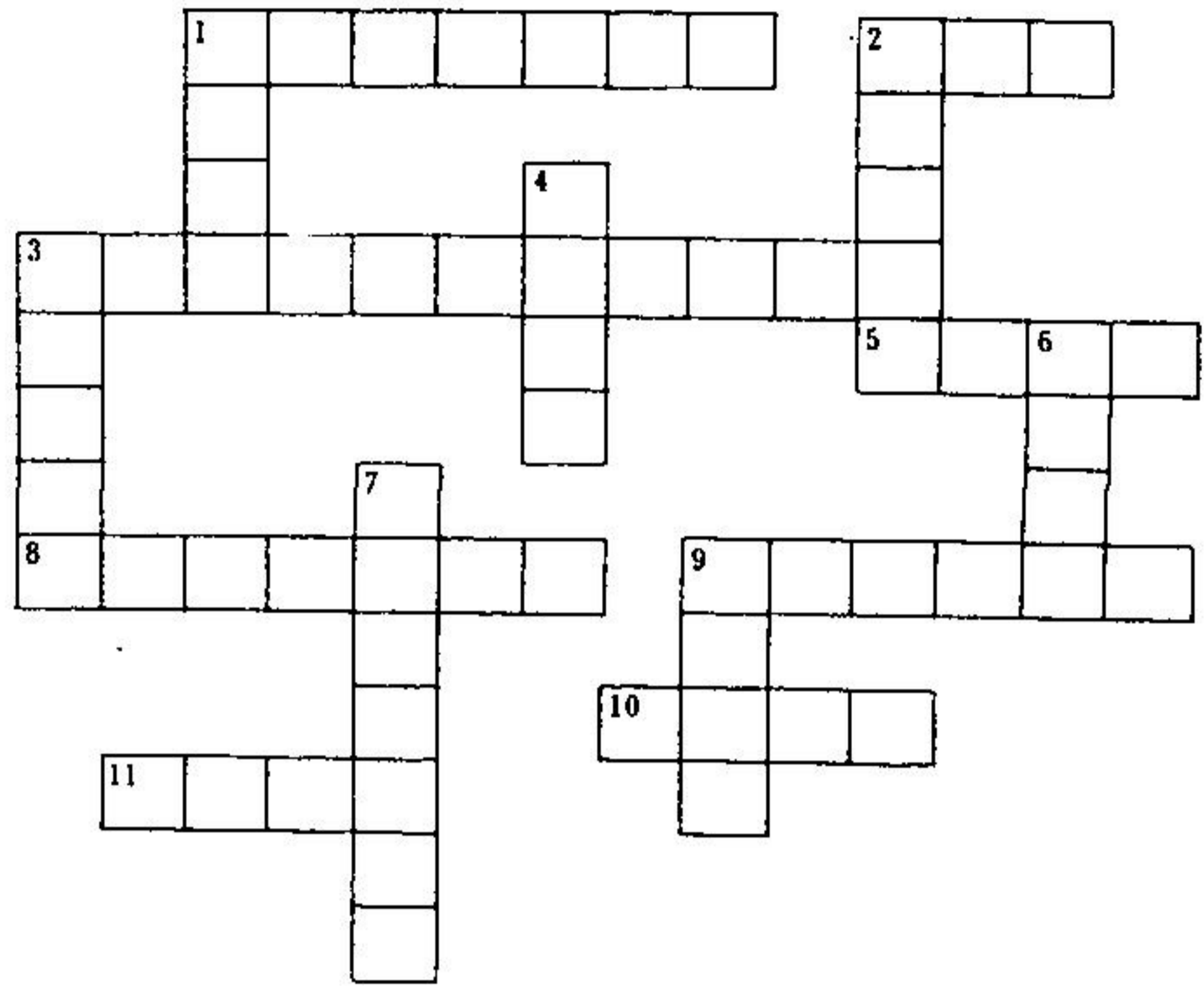



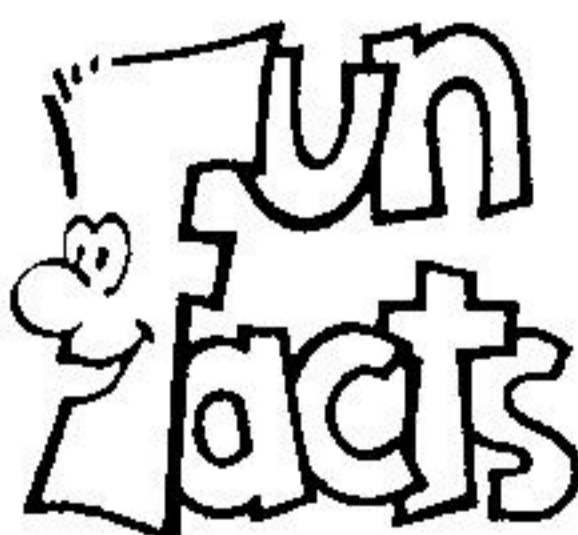
BOOKS

1. The highest regularly performed dive is that of profession-

- al divers from La Quebrada ("the break in the rocks") in Acapulco, Mexico, a height of 118 ft. The water is only 12 ft. deep.
2. The acknowledged pioneer of canoeing as a modern sport was John Macgregor, a British barrister. The Canoe Club was formed on July 26, 1866.
3. Shane Gould of Australia, before the age of 16, broke every

- freestyle swimming record from 100 to 1,500 meters.
4. The highest wave ever ridden was the tsunami of "perhaps 50 feet," which struck Minole, Hawaii, on April 3, 1868.
5. The youngest person ever to swim the English Channel is Markus Hooper, who was 12 years old when he accomplished this feat.
