## Brass Thimble takes on new flavor

The Brass Thimble country crafts store has given the thumbs up to expanding in its Terra Cotta location.

Owner Marilyn Laugesen is busy rearranging her store and putting the finishing touches on a small addition in order to display pinery products, limited edition prints and watercolors.

The additions will add new dimension to the Brass Thimble which already sells prints, pottery, glass sculptures, duck decoys, hobby horses and a host of other unique crafts.

The biggest venture is the limited edition prints, Mrs. Laugesen said. Featured artists include Liz

Lesperance, John Petrella, Jim Maturity and Georgetown's own Shirley Deaville. She hopes to include works from Terra Cotta artists Elsie and Glenda Norgrove.

Mrs. Laugesen came upon the pine furniture by accident. She acquired a pine washboard one day and it happened to sell very quickly so she decided to try a variety of pinery products and it took off from there.

"They like the country pine look," she said. "Original pine antiques are very costly and a lot of people prefer to have reproductions because they're getting new wood."

"I don't go to the gift stores and just buy stuff. I have a lot of people that I was the first store they ever supplied," Mrs. Laugesen said of the

Brass Thimble.

Another friendly mainstay of the Brass Thimble is Scarlet - a five-year-old black Labrador who occupies the back of the store and wags his tail at customers coming through the door.

"He's part of the store," Mrs. Laugesen said.

But Mrs. Laugesen also gets in on the act making some specialized crafts herself. She makes popular items like welcome mats, hobby horses and clown dolls which get snapped up quickly.

Running a country craft store like the Brass Thimble can be quite time consuming, Mrs. Laugesen said. "I'm pretty well on the go from the crack of dawn onwards," she said.

## Spot checks nab unwary drivers

Police spot checks resulted in 267 charges Halton wide in the month of May.

Of that number 237 were Highway Traffic Act charges and 30 fell into the category various other charges. There were 24 arrests resulting from spot checks and every driver given a breath test in Halton in May was charged with impaired driving. There were 20 impaired driving charges laid as a result of spot checks in Halton in May. Eight of those were laid in District 1 (Halton Hills and Milton).

Halton police stopped 1,639 cars in May and on top of all those charges 293 warnings were issued.

In District 1 752 cars were stopped and 122 warnings were given out. There were 58 Highway Traffic Act charges and eight arrests resulting from the spot check program in District 1 in May. Eight people failed

the breath test after being stopped by a spot check.

So far this year Halton Regional Police have stopped 11,385 cars, issued 1,692 warnings, laid 1,208 charges under the Highway Traffic Act, laid 141 other charges, arrested 94 people and 49 people have been given breath tests - all 49 were charged with impaired.

Five people have refused the breath test so far this year.

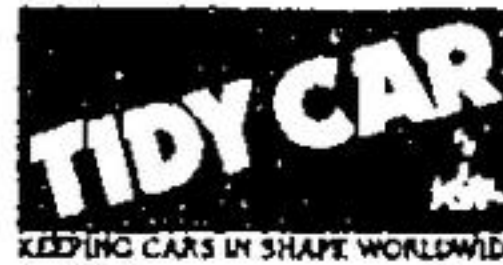
