

Falcons win, lose in recent outings

The Georgetown Peel Falcons split a pair of soccer outings on the weekend, beating Chinguacousy United 2-0 on home turf Friday night, and losing to Sporting Club Ideal 1-0 on Sunday at Century Gardens.

The game Friday opened slowly with the Falcons playing against just nine opponents. Chinguacousy eventually brought their number up to 11, when their coach put on a jersey and took to the field.

The visitors were an experienced team, but lacked cohesion in their attack. The Falcons, on the other hand, were well led by Stu Baines who is now back to top form after sustaining a badly torn muscle. He and Peter Belshaw had several good scoring chances, and as they gain more experience, they will undoubtedly be able to capitalize on such opportunities.

A tremendous effort by the Chinguacousy goalkeeper kept the game scoreless until the half, despite extensive pressure from the Falcons who were attempting to open things up.

The second half belonged to the Falcons as they effectively moved their players forward quickly. Joe Clare switched from midfield to right forward, and the move paid off as he finally scored.

The ball was played man to man from the right back to Dave Banks, who slipped a pass to Clare. From here, Clare ran under the ball and drove a shot inside the post to make it 1-0 for the Falcons.

Newcomers Brinley Hale and Stev Swimscoe settled in well for the Falcons and showed they will be an asset to the team.

Adam Rujk had to leave the game due to a recurring injury he sustained three weeks ago.

Chinguacousy did not give up in the late going and created problems for the Falcons' defence, causing them to give up free kicks in the

danger zones. But the Falcons held firm, putting to good use time spent at practice the previous Tuesday.

The final goal of the game in the last 15 minutes. After three or four corner kicks, Baines deflected a shot with his knee to make it 2-0.

Norm McPhail again played a strong game, and he along with Simon Evans should develop into two good fullbacks.

Sunday, with the Falcons playing their second game in three days, came up against another Premier Division team. Their schedule calls for one game against the premier division and two against teams in their own division.

Sporting Club earlier beat the Falcons 6-1 two weeks ago, and have yet to sustain their first loss.

Coach George Baines changed from a 4-3-3 system to a 4-4-2 system, to add an extra midfielder, and give the team a stronger defensive position. This appeared to help as the Falcons held their opponents to just one goal in the first 75 minutes of the game.

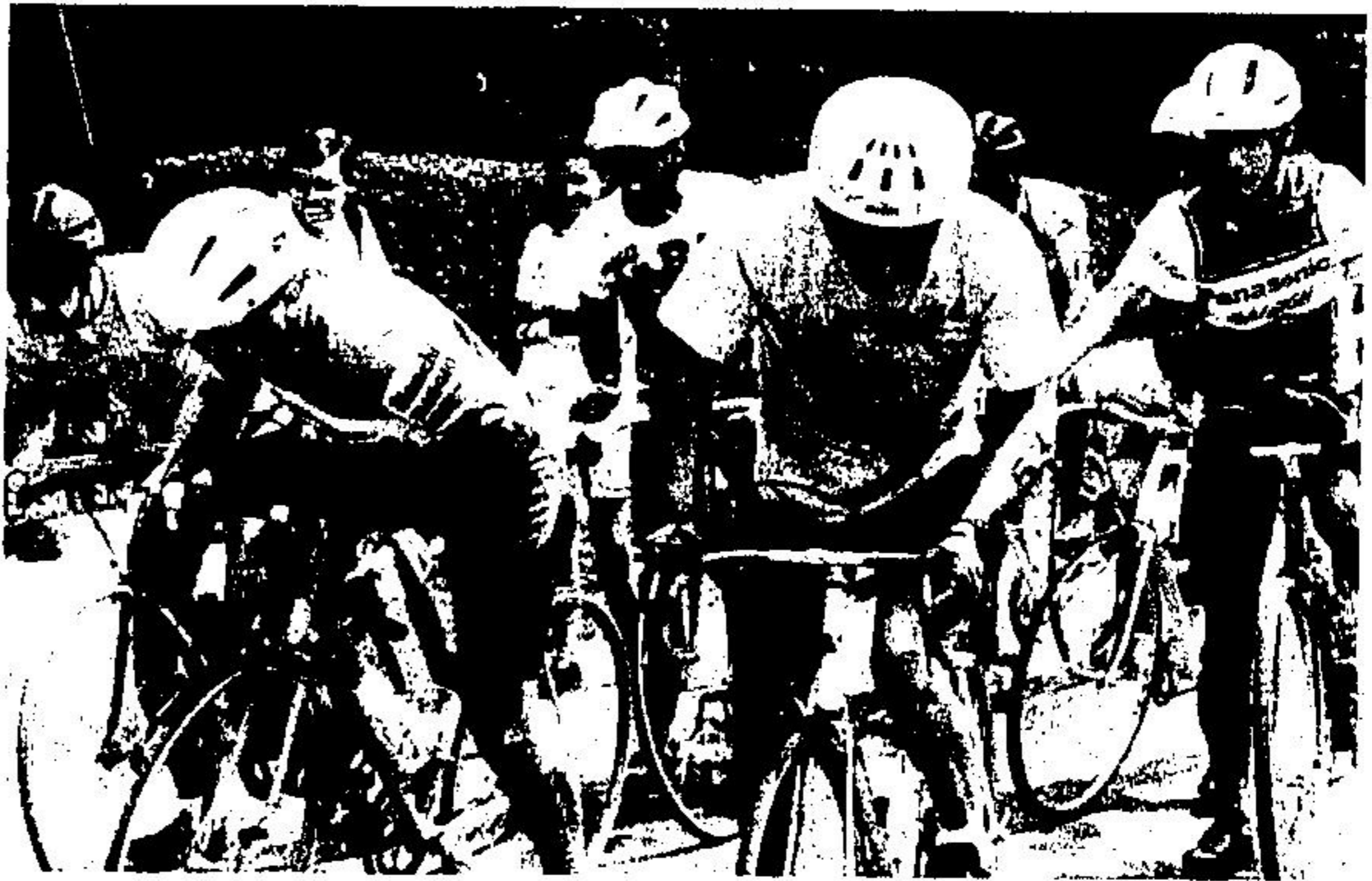
The Falcons came up with a tremendous effort, as every player contributed to the best of his ability, and the intensity of the game could be felt on the sidelines.
