Soggy notes on the soccer picture

It is late Sunday evening, in fact so late, that it is almost Monday morning and by the time this is ended it will be Monday morning. The thunder is passed, the lightning is still around, the rain is pelting down and I have just come in and am soaking wet.

A vast change from earlier in the day when under sweltering sunshine Bryan Turner and I were on Ontario Cup duty in Oakville. Oakville's under 18 boys lost to Niagara 4-1 on penalty kicks after regulation and overtime ties. It is a measure of our success that the visiting coach apologized for an unwieldy bench at one point in the game. And, the home coach congratulated us on the way we handled the game. Both teams had several bookings in a hard fought cup match. Two players ended up with serious injuries, a broken nose and a badly cut head yet the game was played in a cup tie spirit throughout.

It must have been our jinx day for Oakville as the following under 18 girls game ended in a 2-1 loss for Oakville to Burlington. The first half was exciting with a myriad of good soccer from both teams and barely a whistle for any infringements. Although we were late as a result of the previous match being extended, the team officials were long in their praise in the handling of this, a different type of game.

Saturday weather also was hot and sticky and another couple of Ontario cup games kept me away from Cedarvale and the Woodstock picnic day at the crucial times. I can report that there was a fairly large crowd on hand for the occasion. I saw that for myself as I returned late in the day from Burlington and simply did not have the energy to take a closer look.

On Friday I was down at South Common in Erin Mills for a game on a field without markings and corner flags and no assistance from the teams taking part. A qualified and registered referee afterward told me he would not officiate these circumstances. At one point I might have agreed with him, and I also wonder why he did not offer to help.

Thursday and Tuesday were World Cup days - with Haddy Smedema and me and George and Stu Barnes there at Varsity Wednesday was, of course, Inter

County night. Monday was Peel Halton night and referee appointment night. That is the story of a typical week these days. This weekend there are no Ontario Cup games to become involved with and I shall not be at the World Cup on Wednesday for the semi finals. Be prepared for boating hazards

Summer boating weekends can quickly turn to disaster if certain safety guidelines are not followed, according to Staff Sergeant Larry Smith of the Ontario Provincial Police's Traffic and Marine Section.

"Last year alone, more than 55 people died in boating accidents in Ontario. Tragically, many of these deaths were preventable," said Smith.

Even the smallest boat owners and operators must follow Canadian Coast Guard regulations and carry at least one life jacket or approved personal flotation device per passenger, two paddles or oars with rowlocks, one hand-held bailer or manual pump, some type of sound signalling device and lights that comply with current regulations, if permanently fitted. Larger vessels, depending upon their size, require additional equipment.

Boats must also follow sensible safety guidelines when on the water. They should learn the International Collision Regulations, available in any government bookstore, be considered of other boater, especially smaller craft, and pay attention to weather forecasts. A dangerous storm can brew in a very short time.

"Even when the weather is fine, boaters should let someone know where they are going, who is on board when they plan to return, and give a good description of their vessel," said Lee Anne Wright of the Canadian Coast Guard's Search and Rescue Prevention Department.

"That way, searchers will know

where to search and who to look for in case of an emergency. And should the boat capsize, boaters must always stay with the craft," she said.

Before traveling in unfamiliar waters, Wright recommends boaters familiarize themselves with the area. They can do that by purchasing a chart of the area or speaking with local mariners who can usually describe the local water currents, shoals, buoy locations and water regulations," she added.

Swimmers must also participate in boating safety. According to Leo MacKinnon, Director, Property, Casualty Claim Department of Travelers Canada, a leading Canadian insurance company, "Many of our claims involve accidents in which swimmers have been struck by boaters. Swimmers should stay close to shore and swim in protected areas to avoid being hit."

MacKinnon added, "Often boaters are not familiar with either the craft or boating regulations. Being responsible and taking the time to learn about water safety could save a life."

Safety boating courses are offered in Ontario by the Ontario Sailing Association, the Ontario Sailing

League, Canoe Ontario and Nationally by the Canadian Power and Sail Squadrons, the Canadian Yachting Association, the Canadian Red Cross and the Royal Life Saving Society of Canada.
