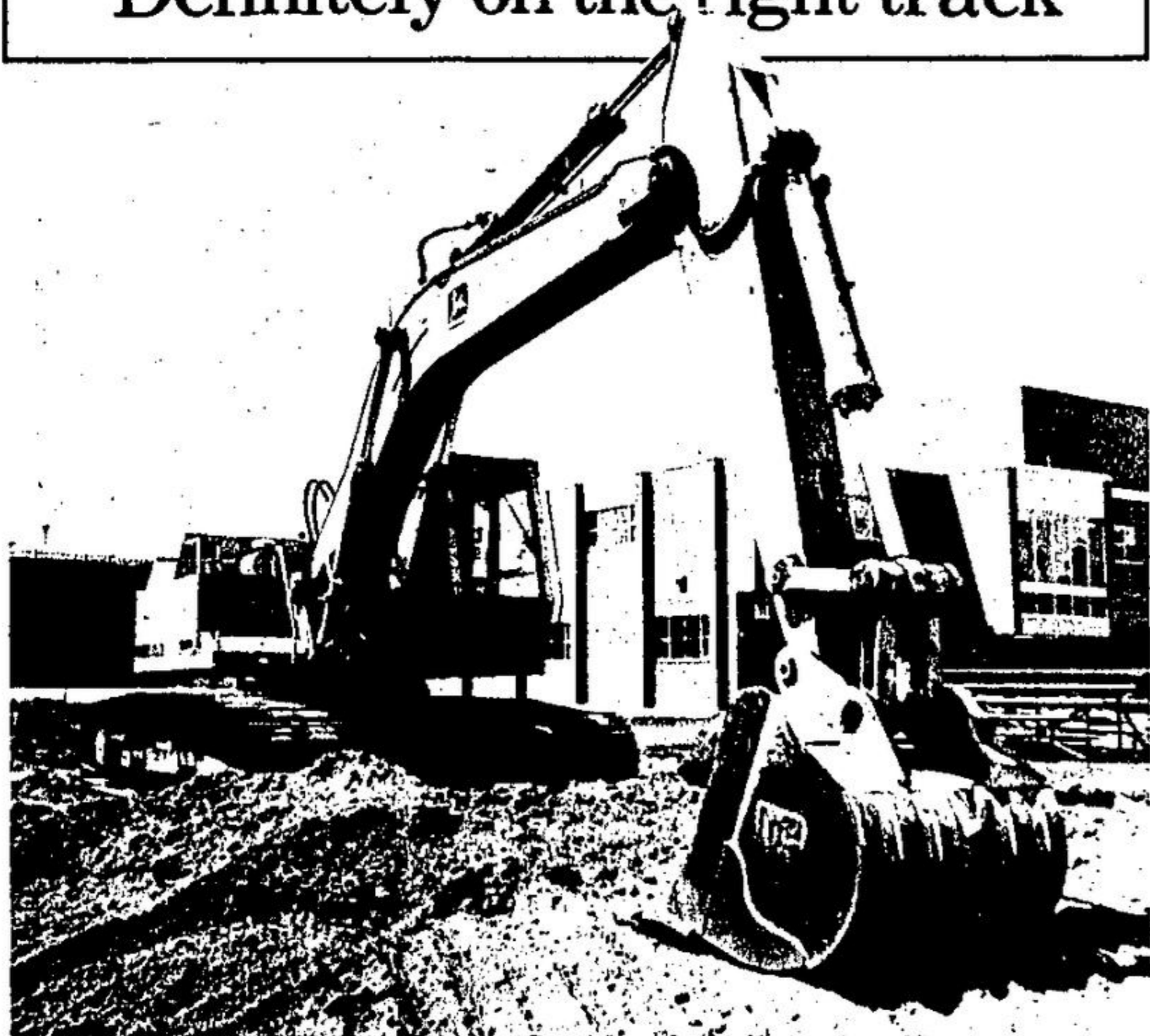


Definitely on the right track

It's a pity we just do not penalize goalies for wasting time by a caution, time wasting being the reason for all the recent changes in this aspect of the game.
