GO employee burned in machine explosion

A big boom sounded over parts of Georgetown Wednesday night. The noise turned out to be an explosion which injured a railroad worker.

An electrical accident at Georgetown's Go-Train station has left one man with severe burns to the upper part of his body.

Walter Klimsiak, 38, of Toronto was working on the trains at about 6:30 p.m. Wednesday, when an electrical mechanism exploded. Mr. Klimsiak suffered burns to his waist, the sides of his body, and his face. He was taken to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital and later transferred to the Burn Unit at Toronto's Wellesley Hospital.

The trains are plugged into an electrical outlet to keep them charged, according to police. It is not known whether the mechanism malfunctioned.

Two men charged with sex assault

A Toronto woman is in fair condition with a stab wounds following a sexual assault early Thursday outside Ashgrove in Halton Hills.


Two Mississauga men have been arrested in connection with the attack, which occurred near the Fourth Line and 10 Sideroad Thursday morning.

Sean Evans, 21 and Bruce Knapp, 32, both of Mississauga, will appear at a bail hearing today facing charges of attempted murder, sexual assault with a weapon and unlwful confinement.

The two men, driving a

taxi, picked up the woman and drove her along 10 Sideroad, where they attacked her. She was stabbed in the neck with a sharp object, police said.

At approximately 5 a.m. Thursday, the woman reached a neighborhood home bleeding profusely and wearing no clothes, according to Staff Sergeant Keith Robertson. She was then taken to Milton District Hospital.
