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believe they can mastermind a shopping trip to the grocery store, let alone a plot to undermine Glasnost and detente and pave the way to World War Three.

The locations are the usual exotica, starting with the breathtaking opening in Gibraltar, on to Czechoslovakia, Austria, Tangier, Afghanistan, and of course, England. This is escapism on a grand scale. That is the enduring appeal of the bond series - you do not think, you just watch the scenery, the people and the nifty cars. However, I felt that by the time they hit Afghanistan they had gone a little too far in their search for diversion; it was just plain silly to pull the Mu-jahedin into the picture, even if we get to see Art Makik (Harry Kumar from the Jewel in the Crown television series). There are some scary moments when Bond and Kara, his lady for the movie, take off from a flaming Russian air base with a cargo full of opium, emplosives and the requisite murderous henchman. But not enough to justify the time spent in Afghanistan,

Joe Don Baker is the slimy, childish Whittaker, and Jeroen Krabbe is the foolish buffoon of a bad guy, General Kraskov, Art Malik plays the Mujahedin leader in the unnecessary sidetrip to Afghanistan; his talents are wasted here. At least I hope he had fun doing the movie.

The Living Daylights has its ups and downs, but it is more entertaining than so much so the fare we have had this summer. And Dalton is a pleasure, a Bond to look forward to for many more movies to come.
