# Make the system fit the player

"He cannot run, he's too small and fat, he cannot tackle, he cannot play his position, he's always wandering all over the place, he's far too bulky to ever make a player." Remarks made about several players in their time. Who were they? You may already have recognized Pele, Bechenbauer, Cruyff, Muller, Gallacher and Mathews. These names are those of world greats in their day, unsurpassed by their peers, and who would be great today if allowed to express themselves in their fashion.

All too often coaches try to make a player fit the system they advocate instead of making the system fit the player. There does not seem much point in attempting to turn a ball playing skillful player into a tiger tackling destroyer. The modern game spends a fair amount of time in systems and 90-minute strength players, thus destroying what makes the game for most people - fair and fair players and coaches.

Bringing out the best in a player, developing the natural attributes of a player seems to me to be more important in trying to change. A natural goalscorer is worth his/her weight in gold. Never mind if they cannot kick, cannot head, cannot run, if they can put the ball in the net that's what counts. Imagine turning Jimmy Greaves or Gerd Muller into a target player, to hold the ball until support arrives!
