### 30 calls to MP per day about Sikh 'refugees'

The landing of 174 Sikh refugees on the coast of Nova Scotia July 12 has provoked emotional reaction from across the nation and Halton residents are no exception.

Brampton-Georgetown MP John McDermid said he was receiving upwards of 30 calls a day complaining about the situation.

"They're saying they should be turned around and sent back," Mr. McDermid said.

Many people are blaming Prime Minister Brian Mulroney personally for the situation, he said.

But he said that's natural in a leadership-oriented society. When anything goes wrong the leader gets blamed, he said.

The Conservative MP said each and every caller has the Canadian law dealing with the situation explained to them and a majority accept his explanation.

But some callers have been "very emotional" he said.

Canadian law, Mr. McDermid said, prohibits Mr. Mulroney from

sending the refugees back without a proper immigration hearing.

He blamed the Liberals for the current situation because they stalled a bill set to deal with the refugee problem in May by introducing an amendment.

The NDP wanted the bill scrapped, he said.

Mr. McDermid said he personally called the Prime Minister after the 174 refugees landed asking him to recall parliament in order to deal with the situation.

A proposed bill would see the hearing process for refugees shortened significantly. An oral hearing within 48 hours followed by another immigration hearing within a month would determine whether people could remain in Canada as refugees or be sent back with no claim to refugee status, Mr. McDermid said.

Current laws allow for multiple appeals delaying the process significantly, he said.

## WHO IS ELIGIBLE TO VOTE?

Those persons who on Election Day have attained 18 years of age, are Canadian Citizens, have resided in Ontario for the 6 months preceding Election Day, are eligible to vote if their names are on the NEW LIST of VOTERS or on

CERTIFICATES TO VOTE Issued by the Electoral District Returning Officer, or if they are Vouched for in Rural areas on Election Day.

## ADDITIONS TO THE NEW LIST OF VOTERS

must be made before  
8 p.m. of Wednesday, September 9th  
Eligible voters, missed during the Enumeration who wish to make sure of their vote, must visit their Electoral District Returning Office to obtain a Certificate to Vote.

## Monday to Saturday inclusive

10 a.m. to 8 p.m. beginning August 20th

The Phone Number of each Electoral District Returning Officer is available from Directory Assistance when it is requested by Electoral District name.
