## Firestone juniors shoot for league's top honors

The Halton Hills Firestone Juniors rounded out their regular season in the Ontario Junior Fastball League in fine fashion as they swept three games.

Last week, the Firestone squad breezed to a 20-1 victory over Shakespeare in Glen Williams, and Sunday in Acton they took both ends of a doubleheader with New Hamburg, by scores of 13-0 and 10-9.

The three consecutive wins came at a good time for Halton Hills as they travel to Conestogo Sunday for the one-day all-or-nothing league championships.

The contest with Shakespeare was a four-point game, and the Firestone Juniors made it clear early on they were prepared.

The locals were ahead 4-0 heading into the bottom of the fifth, when they opened the floodgates and

plated eight runs to put the game away.

They added another run in each of the sixth and seventh innings, and clicked for another six in the eighth to complete the drubbing.

Shakespeare's only run came late in the game and did little more than annoy the Firestone squad who were looking to cap the evening with a shutout.

Jon Hammer pitched seven innings and gave up only three hits while striking out eight Shakespeare batters. In relief, Trevor Riebat allowed four hits and gave up the only run. Neither pitcher walked a batter in the game.

At the plate, both pitchers helped their own cause in big ways. Hammer had three hits in four trips to the plate, including two home runs. He also batted in five runs and scored three times himself.

Riebat was five for six, with three RBI and five runs scored.

Tim Lamers had a good night at the plate as well, going two for four, with one round tripper, one RBI, and three runs scored.

Lamers was on the mound for the opening game Sunday with New Hamburg and gave up just four hits while fanning six batters in the 13-0 win.

Halton Hills scored in every inning except the first. Steve Wagner blasted a two-run homer in the se-

cond inning, while Paul Cargill had a two-run shot in the sixth. The big blow came in the third inning though, when Halton Hills cashed in five runs on five hits and three walks.

In the second game of the evening, the locals had to stage a sixth inning comeback to edge New Hamburg. Trailing 8-3 after the fifth, they rallied for seven runs in the sixth on five singles, three walks, and a three-run homer by Cargill.

Hammer worked the first five inn-

ings on the mound, but was replaced by Kevin Lobsinger who went the rest of the way.

This Sunday at noon, Halton Hills takes on Milverton in the opening game of the league championship in Conestogo. In the other semi-final match-up, Fergus meets Maryhill.

The winners of the two games will advance to the one-game league final, scheduled for later in the day.

## Photo Tips

**Handy Summer Reminders**  
Shot a little more film than you had expected on your summer vacation? Not an unusual situation? Not planning to have all that film processed all at once? Also not unusual when you consider the total dollar outlay when you have to get the household back on track after a couple of weeks away. Here's a handy hint to help preserve your important images, if you find it necessary to stagger your film processing over a period of weeks, reset your 35mm film back in its plastic containers and pop them back into the refrigerator or freezer until you are able to have the film processed. Film after it has been exposed will deteriorate much much faster than it does before its use. By freezing it you will stop the deterioration.

**Needs lots of prints?** When you have your film processed ask for a second set of prints at the time of processing, it is far cheaper to have the extras now at a low price than to have reprints later on. Second sets make great little gifts for grandparents or relatives a long way away.

**Big Weekend Coming up?** Take one or two extra rolls of film on Friday night. By Sunday or a holiday Monday those extra rolls could save the day when there is nowhere within 50 miles likely to have some.

**After one or two weeks by the beach** have your camera checked out for potential sand damage. Easier now than two days before that big birthday, Thanksgiving, or Christmas when it might be too late to have it fixed in time.

**Some super shots taken over the summer?** Now is a good time to have some enlargements made up and then a proper framing job. Framed enlargements make a great and personal gift for that special someone at Christmas.


**Checked your meter batteries lately?** Humid summer weather makes meter batteries "sweat" this "sweat" creates mercury or silver oxide, depending on the type of battery you use. The oxide when built up on the battery or its contact then "breaks" the circuit to your meter. The result no light meter reading or with some of the more modern cameras no functions at all. Take your batteries out and wipe them with a soft cloth and do the same to the contacts in the battery compartment. Solves lots of problems.

**Shooting later in the day?** Nights are drawing in rather rapidly now so don't forget to take your flash along with you for evening shots.

**Afternoon light this time of year** (after 4 p.m.) is getting very long and has that wonderful hazy look to it. Something to have some fun with. Get some good shots.

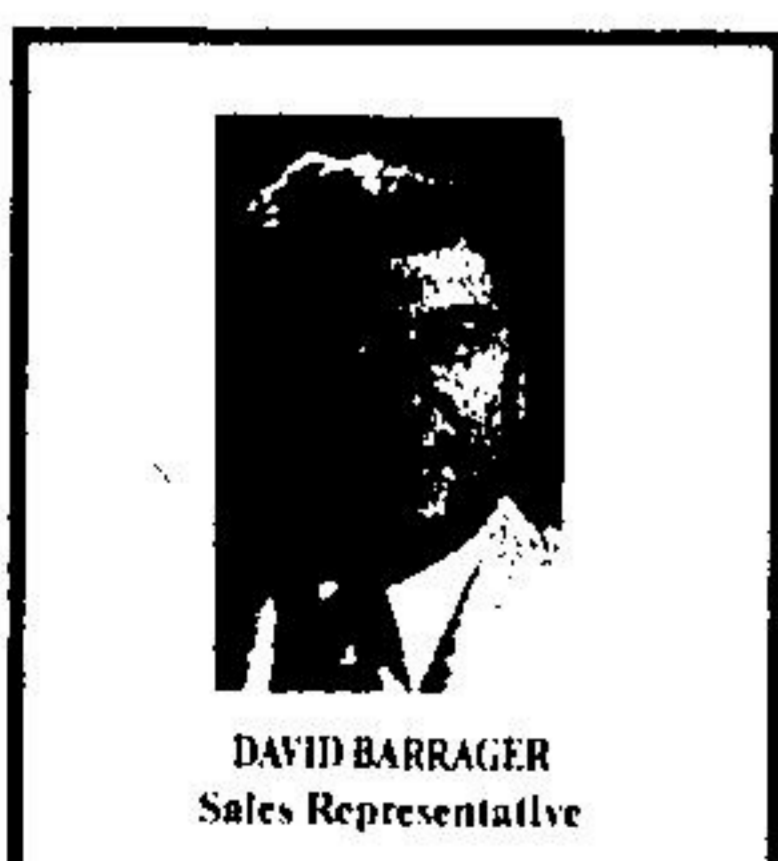
