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Juniors fall short in OJFL title game

The Halton Hills Firestone Juniors failed in their attempt to claim the Ontario Junior Football League championship title on the weekend as they bowed to Maryhill in the final game.

Four teams took part in the championship format, which had the top team playing fourth place and second playing first. Firestone was selected as the host for the event.

The Firestone squad had little trouble in their opening match with Milverton, winning 1-0 to earn a berth in the final. In the other contest, Maryhill upset Fergus. The Fergus had finished top spot in the six-team league, but were unable to outdo fourth place Maryhill.

The final proved disappointing to say the least, for Halton Hills as

they were blanked 9-0 by the fiery Maryhill team.

Jon Hammer was the winning pitcher for Halton Hills in their opening game with Milverton, as he went the distance. The decision to use their No. 1 pitcher in the opening game was a calculated one, according to Firestone's assistant coach Dave Willett.

"We went up there thinking we'd throw Jon against Milverton," Willett says. "We wanted to get by them, and they've given us a lot of trouble throughout the season."

Things went pretty much according to plan, until they found out who their opposition would be in the final.

"We expected Fergus to be there," Willett admitted. "We had pitchers David Haynes and Tim Lammers left to throw, and both had had good outings against Fergus earlier."

In fairness to Fergus, Willett said they were without the services of their top two pitchers. But at the same time, Maryhill definitely deserved to win, he added.

"They used the same pitcher both games, and he held Fergus and us scoreless."

"Maryhill wasted little time getting on Halton Hills as they jumped into a 3-0 lead in the first inning. Haynes started the game pitching, but had to be yanked after giving up two walks, a pair of doubles and a single.

Lammers came on in relief with two out in the first and completed the remainder of the game, giving up six runs on 11 hits and four walks. Lammers fanned four batters.

The Halton Hills bats fell virtually silent in the final contest, as the best they could do was scatter three hits throughout.

After the opening inning, Maryhill scored once in each of the third, sixth, and seventh innings, and three times in the ninth.

What made the loss even more surprising was the fact that they had beaten the same Maryhill pitcher in three out of four meetings during the regular season.

In the preliminary game with Milverton, Halton Hills opened the scoring in the first inning as they cashed in on errors.

Carl Yaroschak was on second after a pair of Milverton errors, and Hammer brought him around when the right fielder flubbed his hit to the field.

Milverton tied it in the third but Halton Hills came back in the fourth when Hammer doubled in Yaroschak to make it 2-1.

In the sixth, Trevor Riebol walked and moved to second on a Paul Cargill sacrifice. Al Scott reached first on an error, and the Firestones cashed in three consecutive runs on back-to-back singles by Bobby Anderson, Steve Wagner, and Jeff White. Kevin Lobsinger rounded out the scoring when he brought base on an error, which reached Wagner home.

Hammer had an excellent outing as he pitched the complete nine innings, giving up the one earned run on five hits and three walks. He fanned 12 Milverton batters.

This weekend, the Halton Hills Juniors take to the field again, as Acton plays host to the Ontario Junior B Football championships.

Play gets under way Saturday morning at 9 a.m., and continues through until Sunday afternoon.
