Hawks remain on top

Round robin playoff action in the Georgetown Over-30 Ball Hockey League continued Tuesday night with three games.

In the opening game of the night, Dave's Service dumped Midas Top Guns 10-3, to even their record off at one win and one loss in round robin play. The Top Guns are winless in two starts.

The McGibbon Hawks remain undefeated and have yet to be scored on in the playoffs, as they rolled to a 7-0 victory over winless Choice Air.

And in the nitecap, Kentners and the Pontiac Fieros duelled to a 4-4 draw, and both now have records of one win, no losses, and one tie to their credit.

On Tuesday's opening game, Dave's Service took the lead early, scoring only two minutes and 27 seconds into the first period on a goal by Brian Johnston.

Woody Fabian tied it up less than a minute later for Midas only to see Gary Bovair give Dave's a 2-1 lead. Dave's Service took a commanding 5-2, second period goals by Gary Bovair (his second), Neil McDonald and Marty Weaven. Midas gunner Ante Kovacevic tightened the score to 5-3 but Midas began to tire (having only two spares).

Dave's Service opened fire, scoring five unanswered goals in the third to win, going away 10-3.

Leading scorers for Dave's included Neil McDonald (3 goals, 1 assist), Gary Bovair (2 goals, 2 assists), Marty Weaven (2 goals, 1 assist), Ted Rombough (2 goals, 1 assist), and Dave Welbur (1 assist).

The second game featured league leaders, the McGibbon Hawks and Choice Air.

The Hawks came out flying, taking a 5-0 lead after one period and led 7-0 after two. Both teams were held scoreless in the third as Rick Rodgers recorded his second consecutive shutout in the playoffs.

Leading the offense for the Hawks were Ian Syme (3 goals, 2 assists) and Brian Beaumont (3 goals, 2 assists), with Brian Hunzinger (1 goal), Gerald Williams (1 assist) and Gerry Coffey (1 assist) chipping in.

The final tilt featured a battle between the two teams who tied for second in the regular season and it was a dandy.

Grant Bodnar opened the scoring midway through the first period for the Fieros, who lead 1-0 after one period. The Kentners opened a 2-1 lead in the second period on goals by Dave Krause and George Coyle only to have Ron Faulkner tie the game with only 15 seconds left in the period. The two teams exchanged two goals each in a hard fought third period and had to settle for a 4-4 tie,

despite several great opportunities late in the third period for both teams.

Leading the scoring for the Fieros was Grant Bodnar with three goals, while Ron Faulkner scored the fourth goal. Gary McFadyen also played a strong game for the Fieros and chipped in three assists.

Kentners' scorers included Don Parker, Geoff Parker, Dave Krause and George Coyle.

Juveniles finish with a flurry

The Georgetown Juvenile Eagles baseball team brought the curtain down on their 1987 season on a high note recently, as they captured the Central Ontario Baseball Association title with a pair of wins over Bloor and Guelph.

The tournament began with Bloor and Georgetown crushing a pathetic Guelph squad. In their match against Georgetown, Guelph found themselves down 19-2 after only four innings. Even though pitcher Brent Falcone was not at his best, Guelph's offence could never start any meaningful rallies. This left Bloor and Georgetown in the final game to decide the title winner.

From the outset, Georgetown came at Bloor B and strong pitching from Chuck Pisobles, the team soon built a 10 run lead before Bloor could get anything going. Even then it wasn't much. This was due, in part, to the Eagles' defence which turned three double plays. After the last out was recorded, Georgetown had walked away with a 12-2 victory.

The reason that the Juvenile team took part in the tournament was the fact they missed reaching the 'B' division of the Ontario Baseball Association by one game.

Near the end of the regular season Georgetown battled Erindale and Burlington for second place in the division, and a chance to move on in to the 'B' tournament. Georgetown earned the ranking by playing the best baseball Georgetown has seen in years. Yet, it was not enough. Even though they finished the year having won 15 of their last 19 games (including tournament action), Erindale won their game as well, thus clinching second spot. It was a disappointing end to the season as the team could have done well in the OBA finals.

Many close games throughout the season can be sighted as the reason

for missing the playoffs, but the teams poor start, one win and five losses, could be seen as the main cause. During that stretch the team only hit for a .160 average.

By year end, the team had shown it's depth as it had six players hit over the .300 level. The final team batting average was over .317.

Highlights during the year include Robbie Ogden's two home runs, Mike Ross's not being beaten by the

Guelph pitcher, Greg Chantler's in credible chewing action, Trevor Banks' inside town catches, Rob Gramada's consistent head band wearing, and Gord Andersson's hat wearing or lack of it.

The bulk of the team is expected to return again for another year. As the team has shown over the past couple of years, with their steady improvement under the coaching of Doc Hodgins, fans can expect even better things to happen.

Cosmetics Can Be Drugs Too

Cosmetics are part of everyone's daily routine from the newborn's baby powder to grandfather's aftershave. Close to \$500 per household is spent each year in Canada on the purchase of beauty preparations and grooming aids. Many are cosmetics and many, to our surprise, are really drugs.

A cosmetic is a product which cleans, improves or alters the appearance of skin, hair or teeth. Familiar examples include make-up, hair spray, nail polish, toothpaste and soap.

But the beauty product or grooming aid we would classify as a cosmetic becomes a drug when it claims to modify body functions or prevent or treat disease. For example, a deodorant is a cosmetic when it covers body odour; it becomes a drug when a special ingredient is added to deter perspiration.

Whether a grooming product is a drug or cosmetic, regulations under the Food and Drug Act and the Consumer Packaging and Labelling Act require it to carry the appropriate directions, warnings and cautions for safe use.

These instructions are important in protecting your family from injury and illness. You should read and follow them carefully. If you don't understand the messages on a cosmetic product, ask your pharmacist for help.

Like many other household products, cosmetics are safe and helpful when used as directed, but potentially dangerous to health if misused. For best protection, carefully observe all instructions.

Finally, we all know many cosmetics have pleasing colours and scents. These properties can be attractive to small children, often with tragic results. Children frequently want to eat anything that looks or smells good.

Many cosmetics contain chemicals which can cause serious injury if swallowed. For your young one's sake, keep cosmetic preparations out of their reach.

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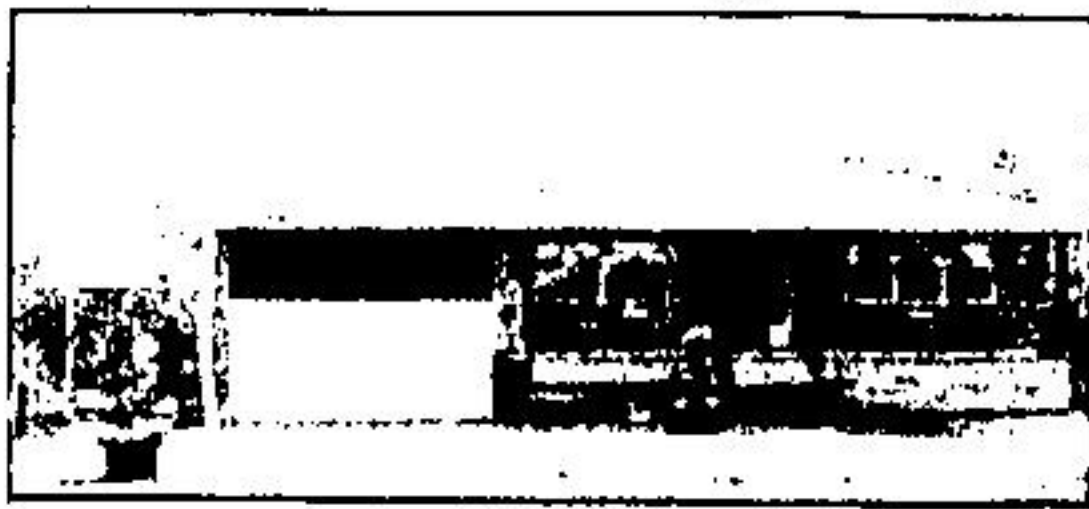
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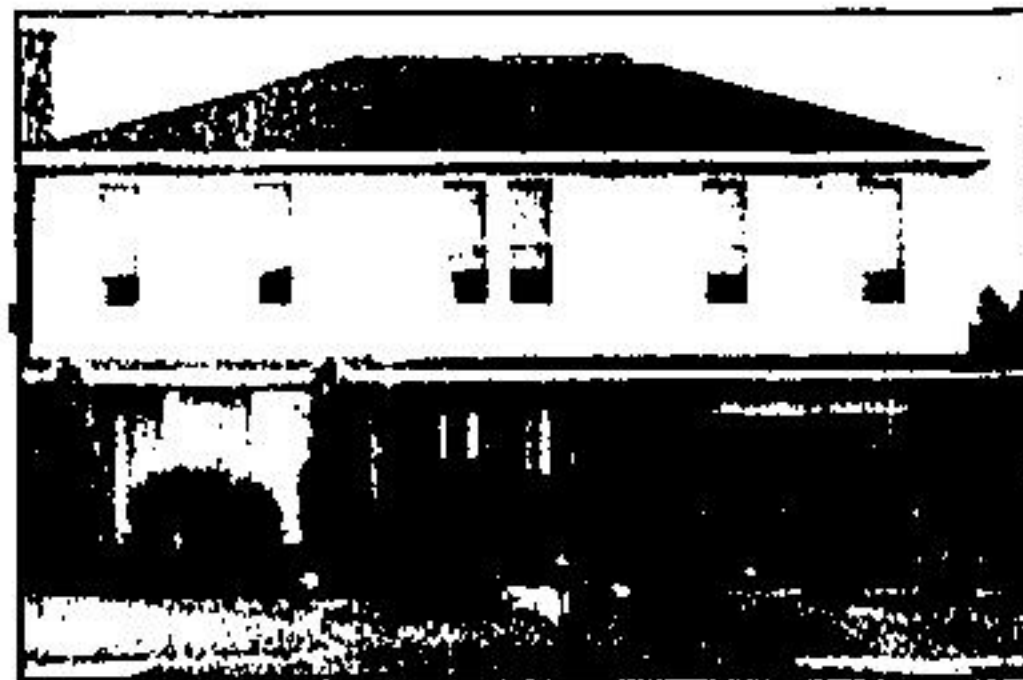
