Longhorns continue to shine in GFFL play

In the Georgetown Flag Football League, Sunday, the strong feasted on the weak and it was made abundantly clear that while the weak (or meek) may inherit the earth, they certainly won't inherit the coveted Maclaren Cup.

Longhorns continued their superlative play with a 29-13 victory over Karry Kitchens and Dairy Queen trounced M and M Pro Sports 30-7. In the other games, Peel County Bandits fell 32-15 to the Greeks and Corrigan Instrument defeated Norval 30-14.

Longhorns vs. Karry Kitchens

The Longhorns continue to impress as the most consistently proficient GFFL outfit.

They've now won nine of 11 games this season, their only losses, nail biters to Dairy Queen.

In this game, the cattle defence snorted after KK passes with the singleminded fever of Khomeini's revolutionary guards. Fully five Kitchens Krew passes were intercepted - two by Bill Allison, two by Jim Lindsay and one by Don Cousins.

The herd offence wasn't shabby either Lindsay, enjoying a red letter day, scored a pair of TD's, a field goal and two converts. Bob Davey and Wayne Densmore also scored Longhorn touchdowns.

For the enigmatic Krew, Duane Wilson and Scott Murray scored TD's. Murray needs only 100 more points to take over the GFFL scoring lead.

M and M Pro Sports vs. Dairy Queen

Dairy Queen was given a scare on the first play of this game as Pro Sport Doug Colter intercepted Queen QB Mitch Leblanc's first pass and scurried into the end zone for six.

The Queen concern was shortlived however, as they recovered and outscored the Pro Sports 30-0 over the remainder of the game.

Randy Lunn, Ron Lunn, Mitch Leblanc and Brian Davis scored Queen TD's. Jeff Lockwood hoofed another lengthy field goal, this one about 40 yards and Ron Lunn bumped the Queen total to 40 points with a two point convert.

M and M continues to sink deeper into a morass of ineptitude and despair. Their only highlights were the Colter interception and a kickoff recovery by the cagey can tankerous vete in Gord McNelly.

Greeks vs. Peel County Bandits

Despite the fact that Peel County was outscored 21 in this contest Bandit players must be mildly satisfied with how they performed in most of their games. Peel County

verts were recorded by Rob Rivers and Wayne Staushis.

Corrigan Instrument vs. Norval
Corrigan solidified their hold on fourth place in the GFFL with this victory over Norval.

Corrigan QB Paul Larose shared the wealth by hitting six different receivers for TD's and converts. Brent Ferguson who will repeat in 1987 as GFFL scoring champ, scored a touchdown and a two point convert. Kevin Harrison, John Larose and Joe Domingoes also scored touchdowns. Brian King and Art Harrison contributed two point converts.

Norval, Playing a little more respectably under a new quarter back, stayed close to Corrigan in the first half with a TD by Riv Kennedy. Len Wassens scored another Norval major in the fourth quarter.

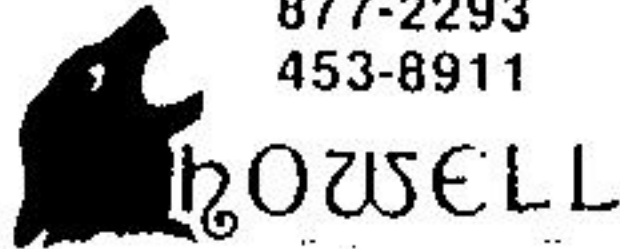
