# St. Marys claims second consecutive title

For the second consecutive year, the St. Mary's Creamery Juniors are the Ontario Junior B Fastball champions.

The St. Marys squad edged Owen Sound John Thompson Movers' Jets 3-1 in the final game Sunday afternoon at Prospect Park in Acton to cap off the eight-team championship tournament, which began Saturday morning.

St. Marys and the Jets have built themselves quite a competitive rivalry. In the 1986 final, St. Mary's won 3-2 over Owen Sound, in a 14inning marathon.

In the end, it was pitching that carried the St. Marys team to victory. They jumped on Owen Sound's Ted Coulter for three runs in the second inning, and that proved to be the dif-Coulter was replaced by Trevor

Wardell, who managed to hold St Marys scoreless throughout the remainder of the game, but the damage had been done. Marc Cameron worked the game

on the mound for St. Marys until the bottom of the fifth when he got into trouble and was relieved by Paul Horenberg.

Owen Sound manager Lloyd Simpson admitted following the game, they started the wrong pitcher. "You always start your ace. If you don't, you lose," he said,

in a pre-game conference, Simpson went with a recommendation to start Coulter. For Owen Sound to win the title, they would have had to beat St. Marys twice in the double knockout format. The thinking was if Coulter could bring them a win in the first game, Wardell would be ready for a second match-up.

For Owen Sound, it was a long weekend. After losing to Nanticoke 4-1 in their opening game, they were forced to take the long way to the final. En route, they defeated Markham (7-0), Elliot Lake (7-1), and in a rematch with Nanticoke they won 6-1.

St. Marys went the winners' route, beating Elliot Lake (14-2), Markham (7-0), and Nantigoke (6-1), before meeting Owen Sound in the final.

Simpson said the extra game wasn't that much of a factor though.

"It hurts you, but we weren't worn down. We had a few injuries but that didn't make any difference. The team that won was the best ball

Brian Dundas, coach of St. Marys agreed pitching was the factor that decided the issue. "It would have been different if they hadn't had to pitch Wardell as much," he said. "That was one advantage we had over them. They hit the ball harder than we did too. There were two good shots to the outfield. We were

lucky they were caught." St. Marys got on the scoresheet in the top of the second when shortstop Pete Bodenham took a Coulter pitch over the left field fence for a solo

Mike Moir bunted for St. Marys and found himself on second after a wild throw, and Derek Rutrig reached first when Owen Sound shortstop Gary Holm picked up a grounder and failed in an attempt to nail Moir off the bag at second. In the ensuing botched rundown attempt, both players advanced, and were safe at second and third.

Sean Hall-then stepped up to the plate and smacked a double up the middle to bring in Rutrig and Moir and make it 3-0.

Owen Sound managed to score their only run of the game in the bottom of the fifth. With Greg Snyder at second and Wardell at first with a single, St. Marys failed to make the force at third on an infield ground ball. The throw went wild and Snyder crossed the plate to make it

Owen Sound proceeded to load the basses after that and Cameron was lifted from the game. Horenberg came in to send Owen Sound down and pitch St. Marys out of a jam.

Following the game, the St. Marys players were presented with the championship trophy, individual trophies, a pennant, and championship jackets.

Owen Sound players received the finalists' penant, crests, and individual trophies.

Wardell was named the tournament's top pitcher, while - catcher Jeff Shipley of St. Marys was named Most Valuable Player, Shipley caught every game his team played and maintained a .600 batting



## Final curtain falls on Firestone season

The Firestone squad staged impressive comebacks in both outings of the Ontario Amateur Softball Association Junior B championships at Prospect Park, but lost 6-5 to Markham and 9-7 to Elliot Lake.

With the best Junior B ranked teams in the province on hand, the cards were definitely stacked against the host team. But many were hoping for a little better showing to end the season.

"I'm disappoited," said assistant coach Dave Willett after the team was eliminated. "We came back in the first game after we were down 40, and we were down 7-0 in the second game. We could just as easily have won either game."

Keeping their spirits up has been a problem for the team throughout the season, according to Willett. Saturday morning, against Markham, the players maintained a high level of spirit thoughout the contest, despite dropping behind early, he said: Against Elliot Lake, however, that atmosphere was absent through the first four innings, until a rally

brought them around.

"When their minds are on baseball, they can play good baseball," Willett said, "But when somebody gets down, it's not just one guy, it's the whole team. We needed that rally to pick us up and get us back in the ball game."

Having lost their opening game, Halton Hills was matched against Elliot Lake, who carlier lost 14-2 to St. Mary's, the eventual tournament championship winners.

Elliot Lake took a quick 3-0 lead in the first inning.

In the second, with a man on, Elliot Lake's Gary Bonles hit a ball deep to left field that sent Jeff White back to the fence. White managed to get a glove on the ball, but it popped out when crashed into the fence for a

two-run homer, making it 5-0. The score ws 7-0 before the Firestone crew finally got something going in the bottom of the

David Haynes led off with a walk, and then scored on a Carl Yaroschak

Paul Cargill took a walk, and Tim Lamers singled to bring in Yaroschak, making it 7-2.

Bob Anderson was able to bloop a ball into left field for a single to score Cargill.

Steve Wagner was the next batter to come to the plate, and wasted no time as he blasted the first pitch over the left field fence for a three-

run homer to make it 7-6. It looked as though Halton Hills might tie the game in the bottom of the sixth when Paul Cargill sent a ball deep to left, but the fielder made the catch at the fence.

Elliot Lake added two more runs in the sixth to make it 9-6. In their half of the inning, though, Halton Hills managed to get one back.

Anderson reached base with a double, and then advanced to third on an Al Scott ground out. Wagner then hit a high pop up to centre field that

dropped in to score Anderson. However, that was as close as they were to come, as Elliot Lake held on for the victory.

David Haynes started the game for Halton Hills but gave way to Lamers when he got into trouble in the third inning. Between them, they allowed 10 hits. Lamers also pitched all seven innings in the team's earlier loss to Markham.

Jeff Doyle and Ron Hodkinson combined for the Elliot Lake win, giving up a total of seven hits.

Paul Cargill is the only player the Firestone Juniors will be losing next season through being over-aged.

Willett expects the team will return to the Ontorio Junior Fastball League, which may come under some revamping during the offseason.
