Kari-Ann Puckering had a home run for Delrex and was named her team's game star.

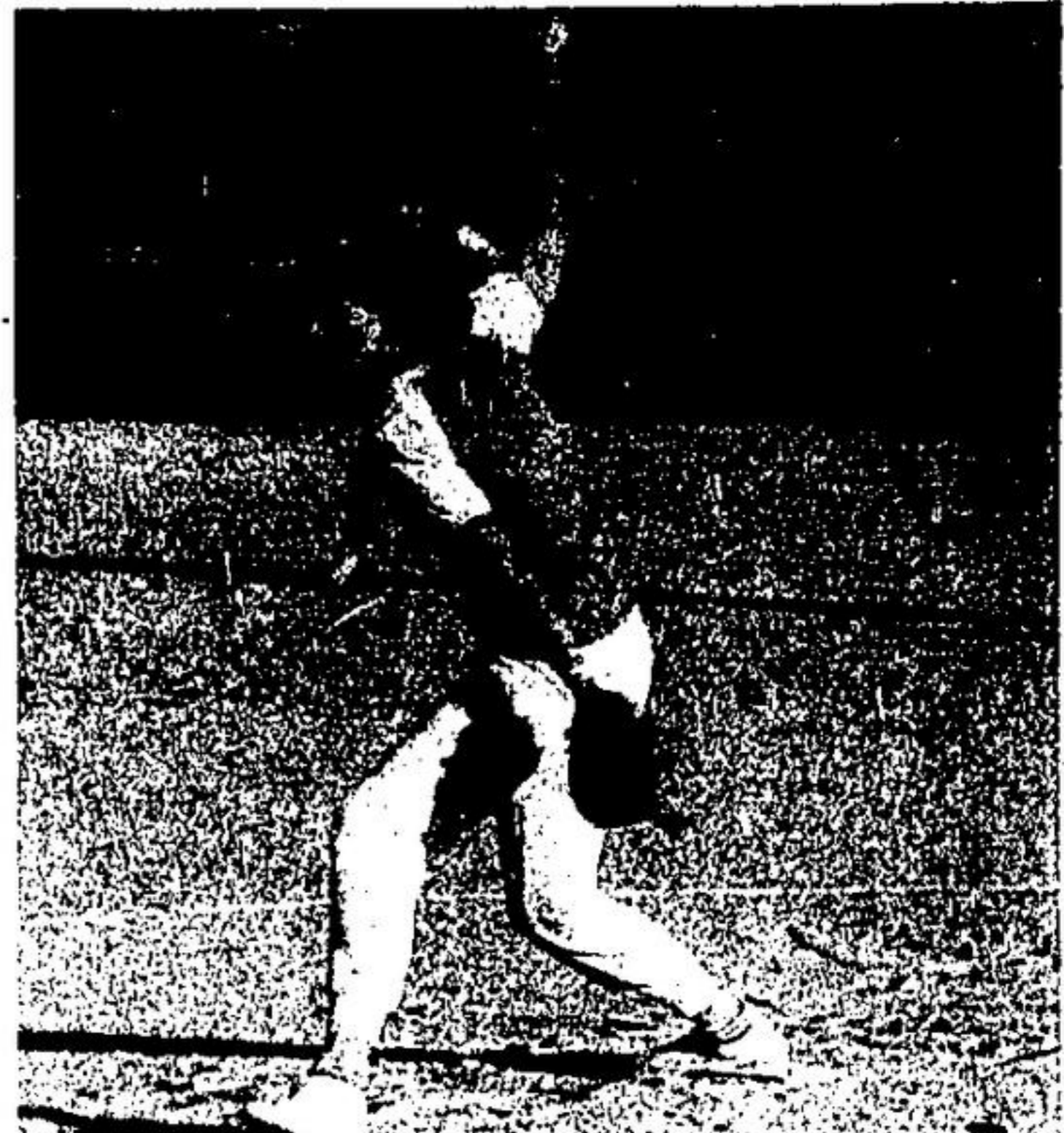
