The winner's prizes include a trip to Great Britain, a dairy calf and a silver tea service.

The preliminaries of the competition are being held at 6 p.m. daily, August 26-29, in the small judging ring, Coliseum East Annex. Semi-finals will be held at 6 p.m. August 31 and September 1 in the Coliseum Main Ring. The 32nd Ontario Dairy Princess will be crowned on Agriculture Day at the C.N.E. Sept. 2, 1987 at 6:30 in the Main Ring of the Coliseum.

## Syl Apps youth centre Board's responsibility?

The Halton Board of Education is reviewing a policy by the Ministry of Education to take over the running of the Syl Apps Youth Centre in Oakville.

The centre is a reform school for young offenders. Under the terms of the proposal the Ministry of Community and Social Services would continue to run a training centre at Syl Apps while the Halton Board would assume the responsibility of the education program.

All the teaching staff, secretaries and classroom assistants would become employees of the Halton school board.

Trustee Len Crosier said he is wary of a plan that will bring the extra responsibility to the Halton Board of Education. There was some confusion among the trustees that the residents of Syl Apps are considered also to be residents of Halton Region.

Special Education Superintendent Garry Crossman told the board the students are residents of Halton Region.

"The Ministry may call it 'divestment' but I call it 'unloading'," Len Crosier said. "The local taxpayer may get stuck with the cost of educating these people."

The Board will vote on the proposal at its next meeting September 9.


