Stake Out

At last, a movie I can heartily recommend. Stake Out is a comedy, a romance and a suspense film. And it works on all levels. You can laugh uproariously or be scared out of your seat. All for the price of one movie!

Richard Dreyfuss and Emilio Estevez are two policemen who are forced into night duty on a stake-out for the F.B.I. Dreyfuss (Chris) and Estevez (Bill) set up a routine stake-out procedure whereby they tap the phone, watch their quarry through binoculars and exchange practical jokes with the day team. But somehow, this isn't just another routine job.

Although described as weighing 313 lbs., (She could be the house quips Dreyfuss), the description is obviously a typo. Madeleine Stowe plays Maria, the slender ex-girlfriend that Dreyfuss soon comes to know more intimately than he should.

He meets her when he poses as a

phone man to tap her telephone. He is immediately drawn to her. Soon Chris is building a relationship with the woman he should be watching from across the street, not from under, or in, her bed.

The movie is beautifully paced. The opening scene sets the tone with the escape of a cop-killing convict. Aidan Quinn, who plays the terrifying and violent Richard Montgomery, makes a brutal jail break that immediately shows us that this guy likes to kill and maim. After the escape we cut to Chris and Bill, who are down on the docks of Seattle (Vancouver), trying to capture a punk haired criminal. One of the most disgusting scenes takes place as Chris and Bill are eating breakfast with their eyes on dock: Chris' version of an Egg McMuffin is enough to put you off food for a week! The chase that follows is both suspenseful and funny, not to mention rather revolting. (Think FISH). And so the movie goes - scenes of romance followed by comedy follow-

A converted convict preaches the gospel

Lawrence Trafford had been criminally charged 87 times and sentenced to 40 years by the time he was 32, but he won't be going back. Since January 1981, when he committed his life to Jesus Christ in Prince Albert prison, Trafford has been preaching the gospel. On September 29 at 7:30 p.m. he will be speaking at the Cultural Centre, Georgetown sponsored by Halton Hills Outreach Faith Ministry (877-4853).

Lawrence Trafford was arrested as a teenager for theft. A series of crimes climaxed in 1960 when he beat a man almost to death. His little girl begged her daddy to come home, and prisons tried to rehabilitate him at no avail.

The public is welcomed to Trafford's local meeting and no admission is charged.

One night, in his Prince Albert cell he started weeping and asking God to forgive him and change his life. Immediately he started telling his cellmates he was through with crime. Six years of straight living back up his testimony.

Today, Lawrence is busy doing the work of an evangelist in prisons and

churches. He has given his testimony in over 150 churches. His miraculous conversion has miraculously bridged the gaps that divide Christians, as Pentecostals, Alliance, Lutheran, Church of God, Baptist, United, Mennonites, and Apostolics, alike have welcomed him to their pulpits. A group of 50 Catholic laymen invited him to tell his story and Lawrence reports many received Christ.

A Tasty Recipe

DAWN'S GINGER SNAPS COOKIES

- 3/4 cup shortening
- 1/4-1/2 cup molasses
- 2 cups flour
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cloves
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 egg
- 1/4 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. ginger

Cream shortening and sugar. Add molasses and egg, beat well. Sift dry ingredients and add to shortening mixture. Roll into small balls (size of small plums) and roll in white sugar. Drop on greased baking sheet. Bake at 350 F for 10-12 minutes. Makes approx. 50 cookies.

ed by terror in the trail of blood that Montgomery leaves across the state - leading to a scary, but satisfying, conclusion.

Dreyfuss' performance is absolutely brilliant. His timing is perfect, his reactions hilarious. Some of the funniest scenes occur when Dreyfuss tries to hide his identity when the day shift is on duty. He belatedly attempts to disguise his voice on the phone as the conversation is recorded and later, when he wakes up in Maria's bed, about to make love again, then realizes the time and tries to escape without being identified by his colleagues, the consequences are uproarious. The older he gets, the better he gets. Dreyfuss is maturing remarkably well.

Emilio Estevez is perfect as the stable young cop trying to keep his older colleague out of trouble. He is worried, but he retains his sense of humour. He throws himself into the practical joke war with the day shift

with wonderful ingenuity. Estevez is definitely the second banana here, not as easy role to play. But he does an admirable job. (Estevez is Martin Sheen's son and Charlie Sheen's older brother. You can see the family resemblance.)

Aidan Quinn is marvelous as the brutal Montgomery. On the scale of movie villains - Dennis Hopper as Frank Booth in Blue Velvet is my ten - Quinn as Montgomery is an eight. This means he is a pretty scary guy. His blue eyes are as cold as the Arctic, his soul as black as they come. Madeleine Stowe is a pretty and gutsy Maria, in love but angry with Chris, the voyeur who crossed the line.

This is definitely an adult movie. There is a fair amount of violence, a lot of coarse language. But the kids had the theatre most of the summer so it's time for some entertainment for grown-ups. It is rated AA. If you are not scared by suspense, go see this film.

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
