Bantams foiled in quest

The Georgetown Standard Products Bantam "A" Eagles were foiled in their attempt to claim a provincial title on the weekend as they took part in the Ontario Baseball Association Bantam B championships in Kirkland Lake.

After losing their opening game, the Eagles fought back to reach the finals of the seven-team tournament, but lost to a strong entry from Wallaceburg, 12-2.

In turning up for the event, the Eagles had only exhibition games over the last several weeks, which may have taken its tell, according to manager Brian Hannah.



The dream of a courageous young man continues to live on this Sunday, as people all over the nation will be taking part in the Seventh Annual Terry Fox Run.

Special events have been planned for both Georgetown and Acton, in an effort to raise money for cancer

The Georgetown Track Club is coordinating the effort in Georgetown, which will be focused at the new track at Georgetown District High School.

Teams consisting of up to five run-ners will take to the track with each member completing a leg of five laps, or two kilometres. The challenge of pitting one team

against another is being encouraged for both corporate contingents and school groups. Those participating can run, walk, or wheelchair around the track, and

a separate course has been set up for those who wish to bicycle or

skateboard around the 10-km course. Ribbons will be awarded in several categories, including under 12-year-old, 12 to 19-years-old, the corporate open category, and the men general category.

Prizes will also be given out in each category for male, female, and mixed divisions.

In Georgetown, participants will be attempting to better the \$1,800 total that was raised in 1986.
