He said that because the Herald is distributed freely in Acton, it would make more sense to advertise in that paper for many residents. Mr. Elliott said, the Herald is the only paper they receive. Council then amended the motion to include advertising in the Herald.

Town debates warehouse proposal for rural land

A proposal to build a warehouse on agricultural land prompted debate at Monday's council meeting.

Councillor Joe Hewitt rejected a proposal to build at the corner of Winston Churchill Boulevard and Steeles Avenue forward by 676204 Ontario Ltd.

"This reminds me of a strip development piece and that is something I personally don't want to see on this corner," Coun Hewitt said.

Councillor Hewitt also questioned the impact of increased traffic in the area.

Glen Schmitt, Land Use Planner and Brian Atkins, Architect, answered questions from councillors about the proposal. Mr. Schmitt told Councillor Hewitt that the area shows a need for the kind of building being proposed.

The proposal also involves building a country market on the front section of the property flanking

'White' waste day coming

Residents will now be able to rid themselves of broken fridges or other large pieces of garbage.

Council passed a motion by Councillor Joe Hewitt Monday to introduce one to two days of free dump service for large "white items" including fridges, freezers, couches or televisions.

Councillor Hewitt told members that workers from the town were already spending many hours per year picking up large pieces of garbage dumped along areas of the Bruce Trail. He said the town may as well offer the free dump days to the public to avoid the mess.

Steam Era over

Ontario Steam Era is over for another year and enjoyed four great days of fine dry weather.

Agriculture representative Phylis McMaster opened the event and said she was proud to open this show, that was preserving the past for the future.

Winston Churchill Boulevard. The warehouse and storage area would be erected on the bottom half of the property.

The site in question is on the southwest corner of the intersection about 600 feet from Steeles Avenue.

Planning Director Ian Keith said he had no traffic statistics on the area but noted that the "scale of use" of the routes would be moderate even with the extra building.

The town's Planning Department supports the development and changing the zoning from Rural to Rural Industrial.

Councillor Pam Sheldon pointed out that the developers have already approached the Regions of Halton and Peel, the city of Brampton and Halton's Agricultural Advisory Committee. None of the groups object to the plan.

Peter Norton asked why the warehouse has to go on rural land.

But, Ian Keith reminded Councillor Norton that the site is already isolated on three sides by land not in use for agricultural purposes.

A gas bar and a radio tower further south of the intersection are situated near the site. "It won't affect the rural characteristics of the area," the Planning Director said.

Mayor Russ Miller told council he will support the proposal.

"For 15 years we've tried to encourage industrial rural development," the Mayor said. He added that he felt the proposal to be worthy of council's favor.

Council then endorsed the zoning change which would permit the development.

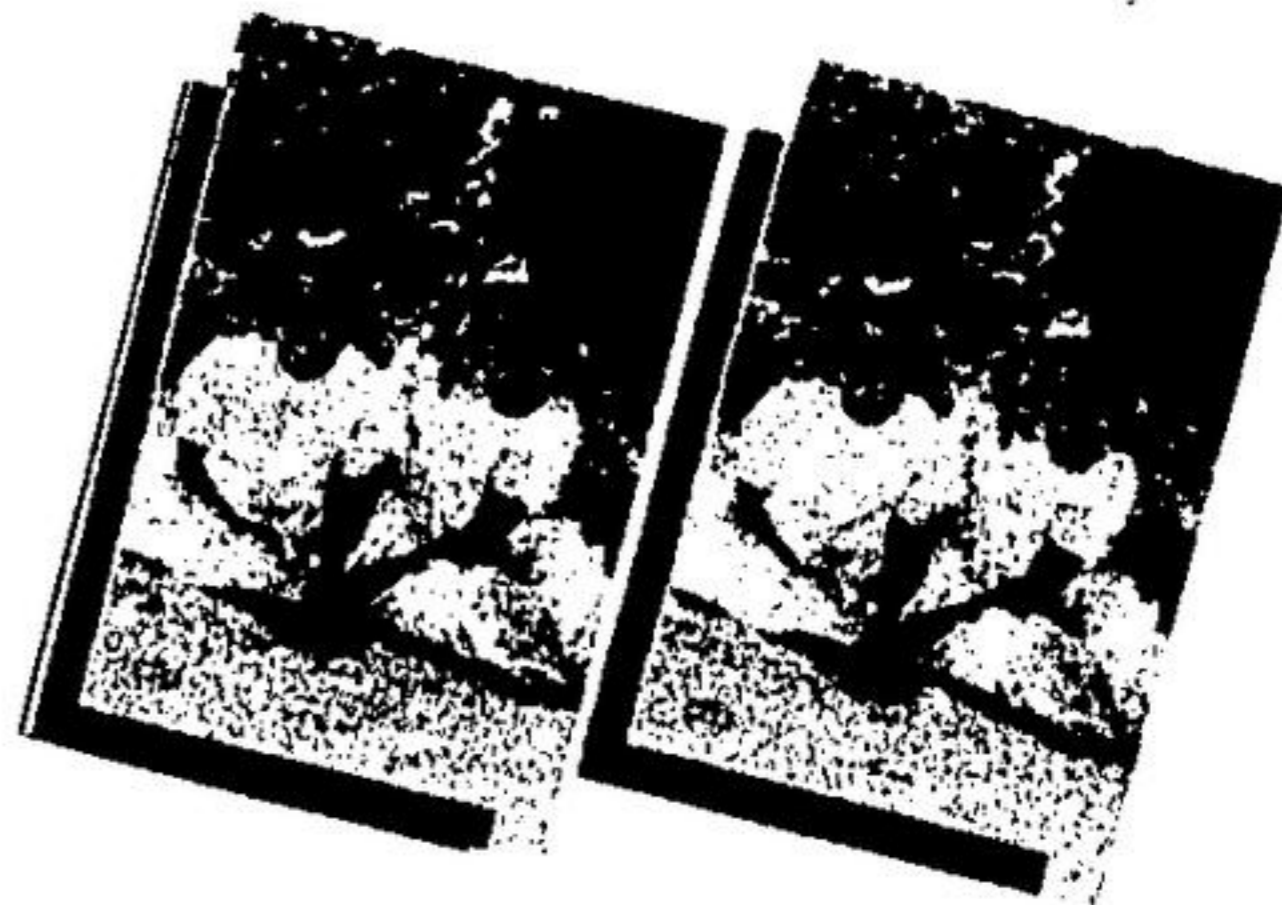

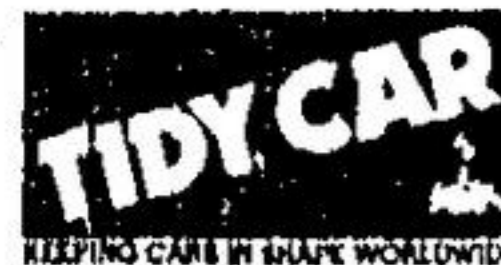

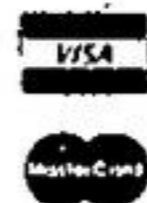
