Town debates warehouse proposal for rural land

agricultural land prompted debate at Monday's council meeting.

Councillor Joe Hewitt rejected a proposal to build at the corner of Winston Churchill Boulevard and Steeles Avenue forward by 676204 Ontario Ltd. "This reminds me of a strip

Councillor Hewitt also outstroned the impact of increased traffic in the

Glen Schnarr, Land Use Planner and Brian Atkins, Architect, answered questions from councillors about the proposal. Mr. Schnarr told Councillor Hewitt that the area shows a need for the kind of building being proposed.

The proposal also involves building a country market on the front section of the property flanking

Council passed a motion by Councillor Joe Hewitt Monday to introduce one to two days of free dump service for large "white items" including fridges, freezers, couches or televisions.

Councillor Hewitt told members that workers from the town were already spending many hours per year picking up large pieces of garbage dumped along areas of the Bruce Trail. He said the town may as well offer the free dump days to the public to avoid the mess.

Peter Norton asked why the warehouse has to go on rural land. But, Ian Keith reminded Coun-

cillor Norton that the site is already isolated on three sides by land not in use for agricultural purposes. A gas bar and a radio tower fur-

ther south of the intersection are situated near the site. "It won't affect the rural characteristics of the area," the Planning Director said.

Mayor Russ Miller told council he will support the proposal.

"For 15 years we've tried to en-courage industrial rural development," the Mayor said. He added that he felt the proposal to be worthy of council's favor.

Council then endorsed the zoning change which would permit the development.

smooth. Set in a pan of warm water to melt sugar.

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
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
