Artisans offering fall courses for all types

The summer's over, the kids are back to school and our thoughts turn to creativity, learning new crafts or reacquainting ourselves with familiar ones. To tempt you, the Credit Valley Artisans are once again offering a selection of popular courses.

A perennial favourite is Beginner's Weaving taught again this by Joanna Dobbin, president of the Heritage Handweavers. Students will learn to warp a loom, weave plain, buck lace and twill weaves. All supplies are included in the fee. Classes will be held at Park School, Wednesdays Sept. 30 to Dec. 2 from 7 to 9 p.m. CVA Members: \$56, Non member: \$64.

New for this year is Beginner's Tapestry, being taught by Else Nielsen. Students will be taught to make their own small frame loom, the basic techniques of tapastry weaving, colour blending, composition and design for tapestry. Students will be expected to buy the material for making their own loom. Classes will be Mondays Sept. 28 to Nov. 23, 7 to 9 p.m. at Park School. CVA Members: \$44.50, Nonmembers: \$52.50.

Helene Hansmann is returning to teach Stained Glass for Beginners on Wednesdays Sept. 30 to Nove. 18, 7 to 9 p.m. at Park School. Instruction will be given for the basics of the copper foll technique. Alternative methods will be shown and participants will complete a simple light catcher and a more complicated project. Another new offering is Coil Pottery and Clay Sculpture for children 9 to 12 years. Esther Malone and Mary Anne Martin will introduce the basics of working with clay. The children will produce small clay pieces which will be fired by the instructors for them to take home. Emphasis will be on slab and coil techniques. Fee includes supplies and firing. Tuesdays, Sept. 29 to Nov. 17, 4:30 to 6 p.m. at Park School. Fee \$35.

Returning by popular demand is Floral Stylings for the Home with Dalsy Harris, a well known local flower design expert. Although she plans to embark on a professional singing and acting career after completing high school, Hewitt would also like to become a psychiatrist.




