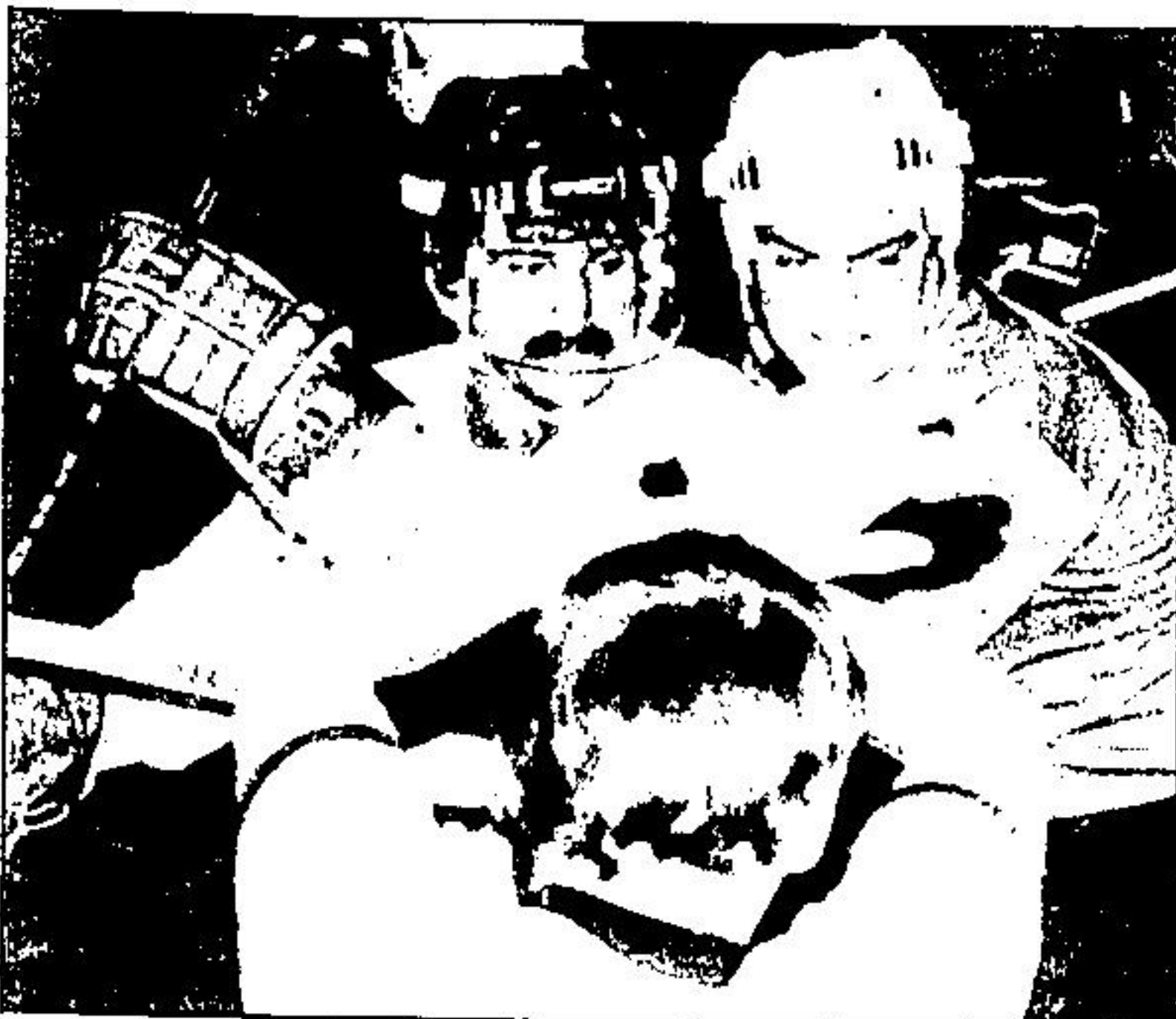


Sports Outlook

Hawks soar to take ball hockey title

In the battle for supremacy in the Georgetown Over 30 Ball Hockey League, the McGibbon Hawks downed the Pontiac Fieros 4-1 Tuesday night to claim the Heritage Bowl, as grand champions in the six-team league.

In other action, Dave's Service pulled an upset over The Kentners to claim the B Championship in the league, with a 7-3 victory.

The other final match-up also provided an upset finish, as the Midas Top Guns, winless in their five round robin games, came through to top Choice Air 5-0 for the consolation championship.

Tuesday night's action opened with the Consolation Championship game between Choice Air and the Midas Top Guns.

Woody Fabian opened the scoring for Midas and solid goal tending by Cec Peacock, especially during a Choice Air power play, helped Midas to a 1-0 lead after one period. Despite a six minute power play, Choice Air could not get the ball past the Midas goalie and Midas continued to lead 1-0 after two. John Edwards gave Midas a two goal lead early in the third period with a short handed ef-

fort. The Top Guns' then opened fire scoring twice more to open a 4-0 lead before Roger Gervais wrapped up the scoring with an empty net goal to help Midas to a 5-0 win.

At Hay of Kentners opened the scoring in the 'B' Championship game and Kentners took a 2-0 lead on a goal by Dave Drause. Dave's then came back with four straight goals and led 4-2 early in the third before Don Parker narrowed it to 4-3. The Kentners then appeared to run out of steam as Dave's scored three more unanswered goals to take the 'B' Championship with a 7-3 victory.

Scorers for Dave's included team captain Marty Weaven (2 goals, 1 assist), Gary Bovair (2 goals), Brian Patterson (1 goal, 3 assists), Don Blewett (1 goal, 1 assist), Dave Robinson (1 goal, 2 assists), Ross Pyne (2 assists), Neil McDonald (1 assist) and Jim Gilham (1 assist).

The Championship game opened quickly with the regular season champs, the McGibbon Hotel Hawks, taking a two goal first period lead over the Pontiac Fieros on goals by Charlie Knoepfli and Ray Inglis. Bill Allison and Charlie

Knoepfli opened up the lead to 4-0 in the second period and although the Fieros had numerous opportunities to score, Hawk's goalie Rick Rodgers was equal to the task and made several key saves.

The Fieros put on great pressure in the third period but only scored once, with Rick Bonnette slipping in a goal with only 29 seconds to play in the game to spoil Rick Rodgers' shutout.

In addition to the McGibbon Hawks winning the Heritage Bowl as this year's Over 30 Ball Hockey League Champions, three McGibbon players were also recipients of the league's individual honours.

Ian Syme was the league's leading scorer during the regular season with 55 points, on 27 goals and 28 assists. Rick Rodgers was the league's top goaltender with a 2.60 goals against average, and Charlie Knoepfli was named the Most Valuable Player for the playoffs.
