Apple crop ripens early

This province's abundant crop of long-keeping apples is ripening earlier than usual this year, beginning with McIntosh, by far the most popular variety in this part of the world. Starting September 5, crisp and ripe McIntosh may be selected and picked right from the trees by the consumer at pick-your-own farms. After you take them home, preserving their crispness and freshness can be achieved best by following these recommendations from Chudleigh's Apple Farm, Milton: "No doubt about it, a refrigerator is the best place to store apples. The perfect temperature is 2 degrees Celsius (35 degrees Fahrenheit) and they should be put in the fridge as soon after picking as possible. Fresh off the tree on a 20-



degree day, the fruit may be 75 degrees or 80 degrees inside; this heat ought to be removed so the crisp texture and juicy flavour is maintained. A little water in the lower vegetable crisper will maintain a high relative humidity to prevent the apples from drying out."

Tom Chudleigh further adds: "If space in the kitchen fridge is limited, try to keep them at 35-degrees for at least two days. A second refrigerator in the basement would be ideal, maintaining good quality for weeks or months. When the door remains closed for long periods of time, excellent preservation results because the slight amount of carbon-dioxide emanating from the apples reduces the normal oxygen content of the inside atmosphere and this inerting lengthens the life of the apple. We use essentially the same system to store McIntosh well into the following year.

After cooling the apples for a couple of days, if a second fridge is not available, then place them in the next most consistently cold spot you can think of - Chudleigh's suggest locations that cool off during the night but don't warm up during the day. Avoid sunny situations and other places that range widely from cold to hot. Good locations may include the lawn shed, the basement window well, etc., cellars in older houses often provide satisfactory storage conditions because limited drainage of the soil surrounding the foundation creates a cooling inside temperature. Check cold rooms of modern homes - usually they absorb the summer heat from the outside soil.

When you visit the Chudleigh pick-your-own apple orchards this September and October, ask for Tom He'll be glad to help you with further information. Drive westward along highway 401 - twenty minutes past Malton airport - then 3 kilometers north on highway 25.

Well boring operator is charged

The Ontario Ministry of the Environment has charged the operator of Milton Well Boring with 13 counts under the Ontario Water Resources Act (OWRA).

A R.R. 2, Milton man faces one charge of operating without a well contractor licence, and five charges of operating without a well technician's licence.

The operator also faces three charges pertaining to failure to supply a well record to the owner of the well, and four charges of failing to supply a record to the Ministry.

The charges follow a Ministry investigation into the events of July 1 and Dec. 31, 1986, when five wells were constructed in the towns of Halton Hills, Milton and Caledon.
