

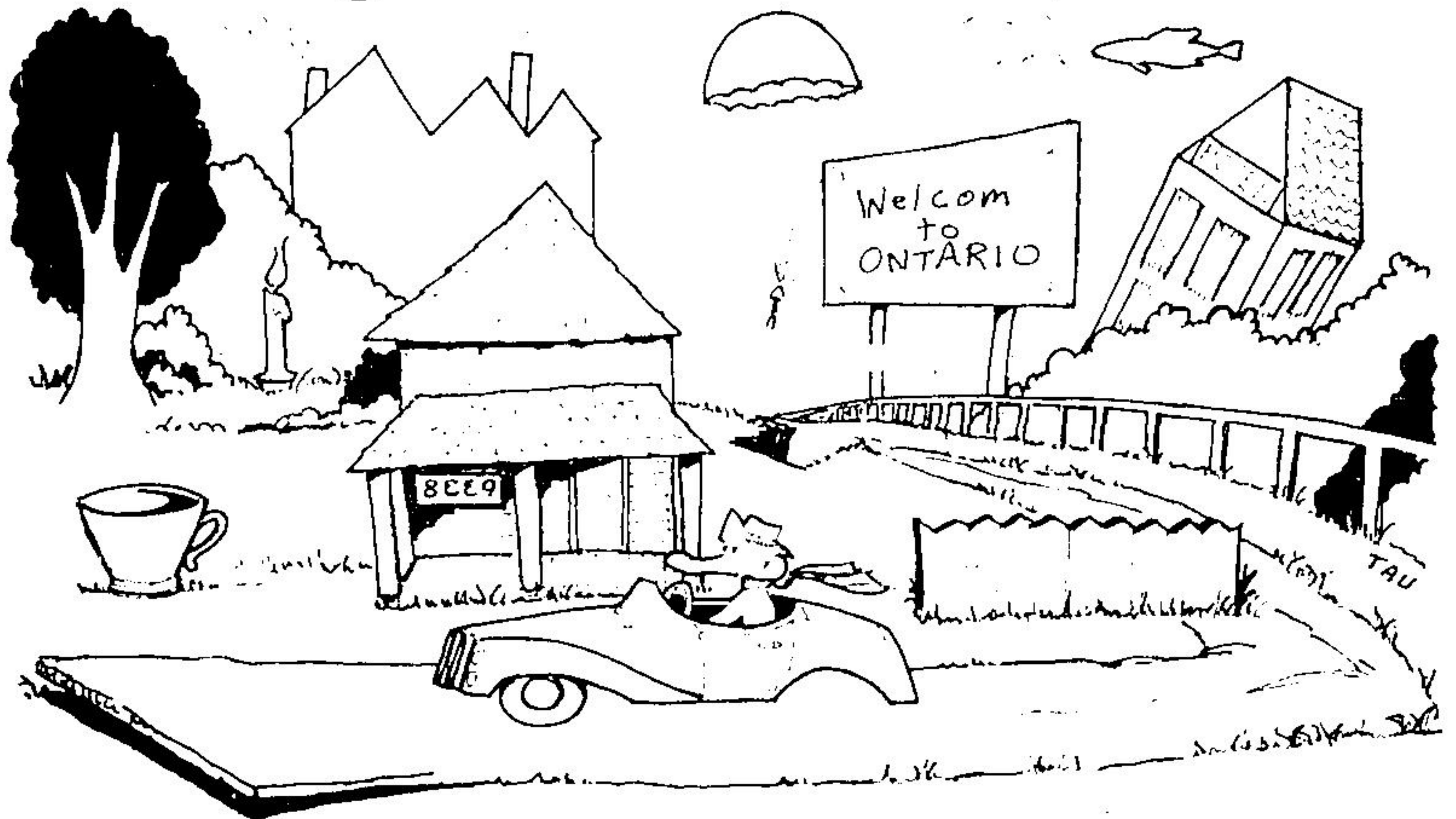

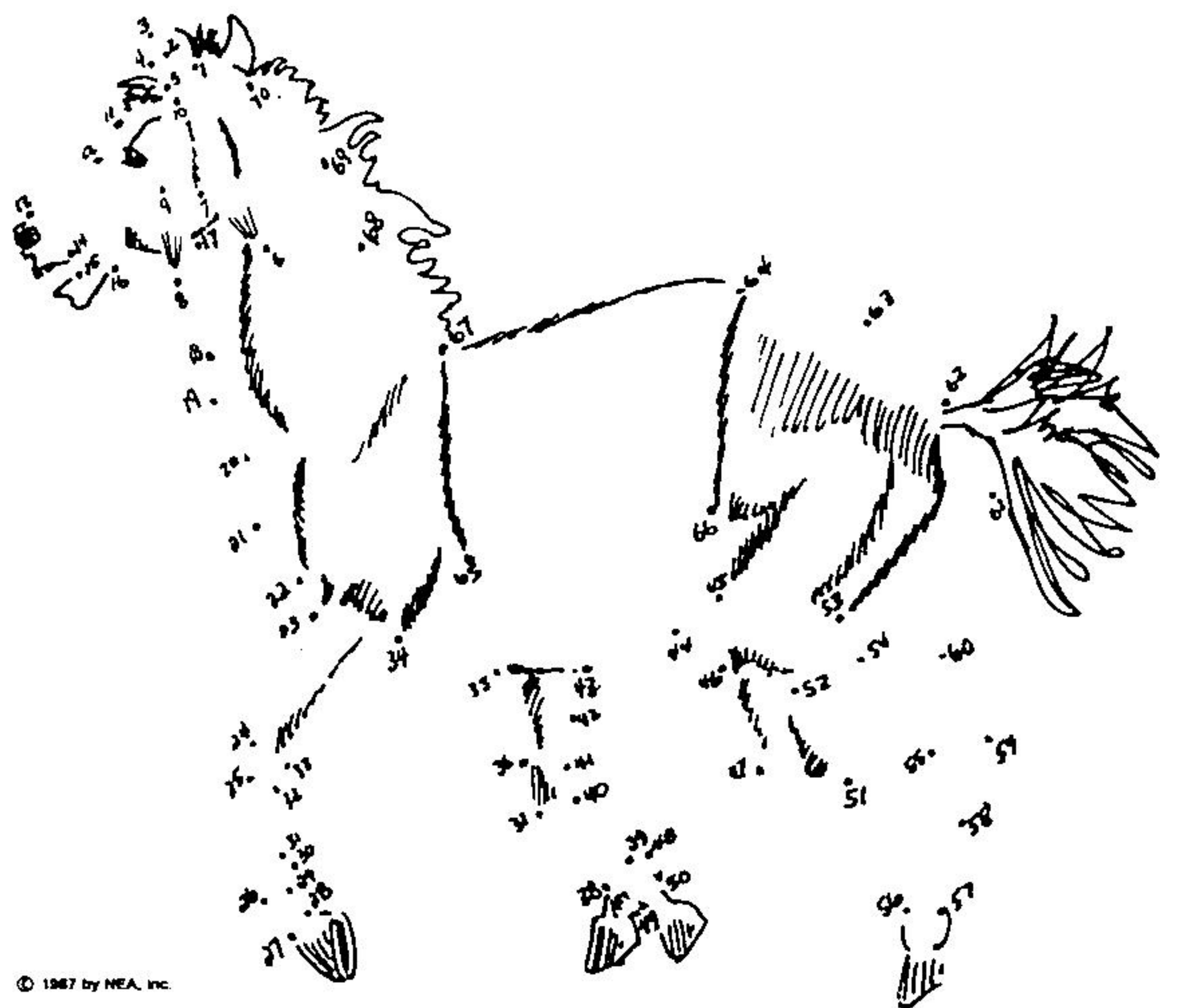

ANCIENT ART

Many Indian tribes were noted for their wood-carving, particularly for their totem poles. These carved cedar poles were originally corner posts for the Indian houses. Later the custom of erecting one large pole in front of the house was adopted. These totem poles were very colorful and often featured designs that were animal-like.



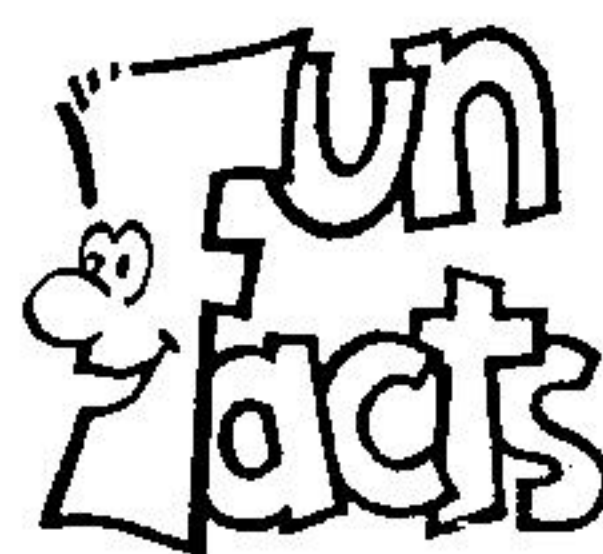
You can make a papier-mache mask of a design that might have been carved on a totem pole. Start by mixing a paste of one part flour to three parts water. Then dip newspaper strips into the paste and wrap them over half of a balloon, while leaving two holes for eyes.

Let the mask completely dry. (This may take a week or even longer.)

Paint your mask in bright colors, and you're ready to go!



1. American Indians are known as the first Americans because they were here many hundreds of

years before Columbus and other explorers found this land.

2. Because of the Golden Eagle's great strength and courage, the American Indian admired this bird and prized his feathers above all other adornments.

3. One rule of storytelling observed by certain Indian tribes is that some stories may be told only during winter months when bears are asleep because it is

believed that some misfortune may occur if the stories are told in the summer when bears are awake.

4. Some famous warriors of the Western Plains earned more feathers in their lifetime than were required for a full-sized headdress. These warriors were allowed by tribal law to make and wear a war bonnet having either a single or double row of eagle feathers hanging down the back.
