English as 2nd language offered by high school

English as a second language classes for adults are again offered this year at the Georgetown High School as part of the Continuing Education Program with the Halton Board of Education.

Green corn season

Crawford Lake Indian Village and Conservation Centre is presenting the "Green Corn Season" starting Sept. 12 to Nov. 15 on weekends and holidays from 10 a.m. - 4 p.m.

At this time of year, the native people who once lived at Crawford Lake during the 1400's would be harvesting their crops and preparing for the winter months ahead. The staff will be demonstrating these ac-Uvities throughout the season as well as providing tours of the longhouse. There will also be slide presentations and displays in the Conservation Centre and of course, the boardwalk that surrounds scenic Crawford Lake.

As part of the Green Corn Season, Crawford Lake will be presenting "The Niagara Escarpment in Autumn" - a celebration of this colourful season - on October 10, 11 and 12, from 9 a.m. - 4 p.m. Daily events include porcelain doll making, weaving demonstrations. photography display, watercolour art exhibit, kid's games and wagon rides to the new Niagara Escarp-ment Lookout overlooking the Nassagaweya Canyon.

On Saturday, there will be demonstrations on spinning, corn husk and apple doll making, plus pottery making. "Fiddle folk" music will keep your toes tapping on Sunday, and the Scotch Block Square Dancers will entertain visitors of all ages from 2 - 4 p.m. on Monday.

The 18th Century Rendezvous will be back on Oct. 17 and 18 from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Once again, visitors will learn about life during the 1700's from the Burlington Sportsmen's Society, Members of this group, reenact the life of a fur trader complete with tee-pees, tomahawks, minature cannons and bartering for






