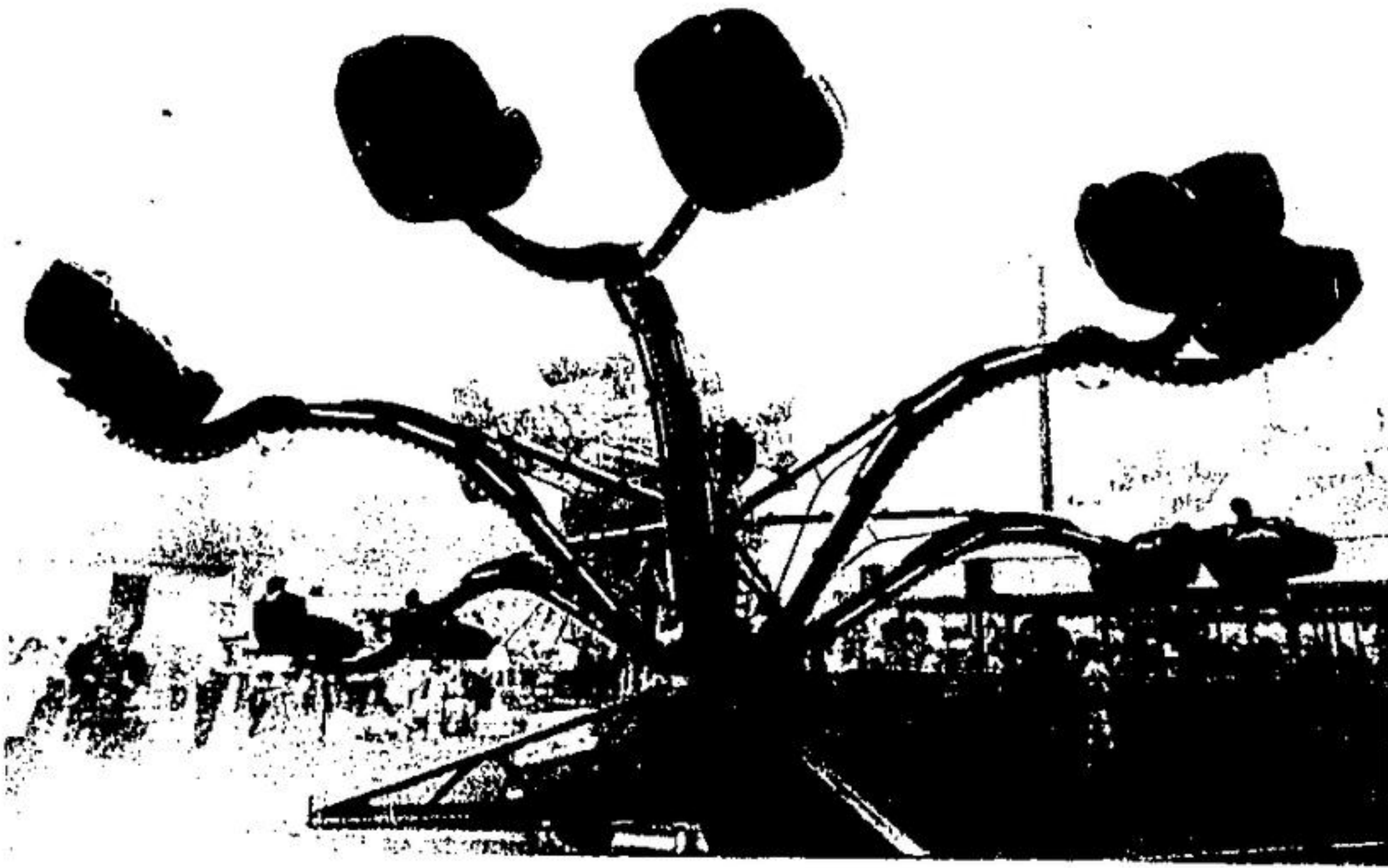


Wet, wild, wonderful - Acton fall fair '87

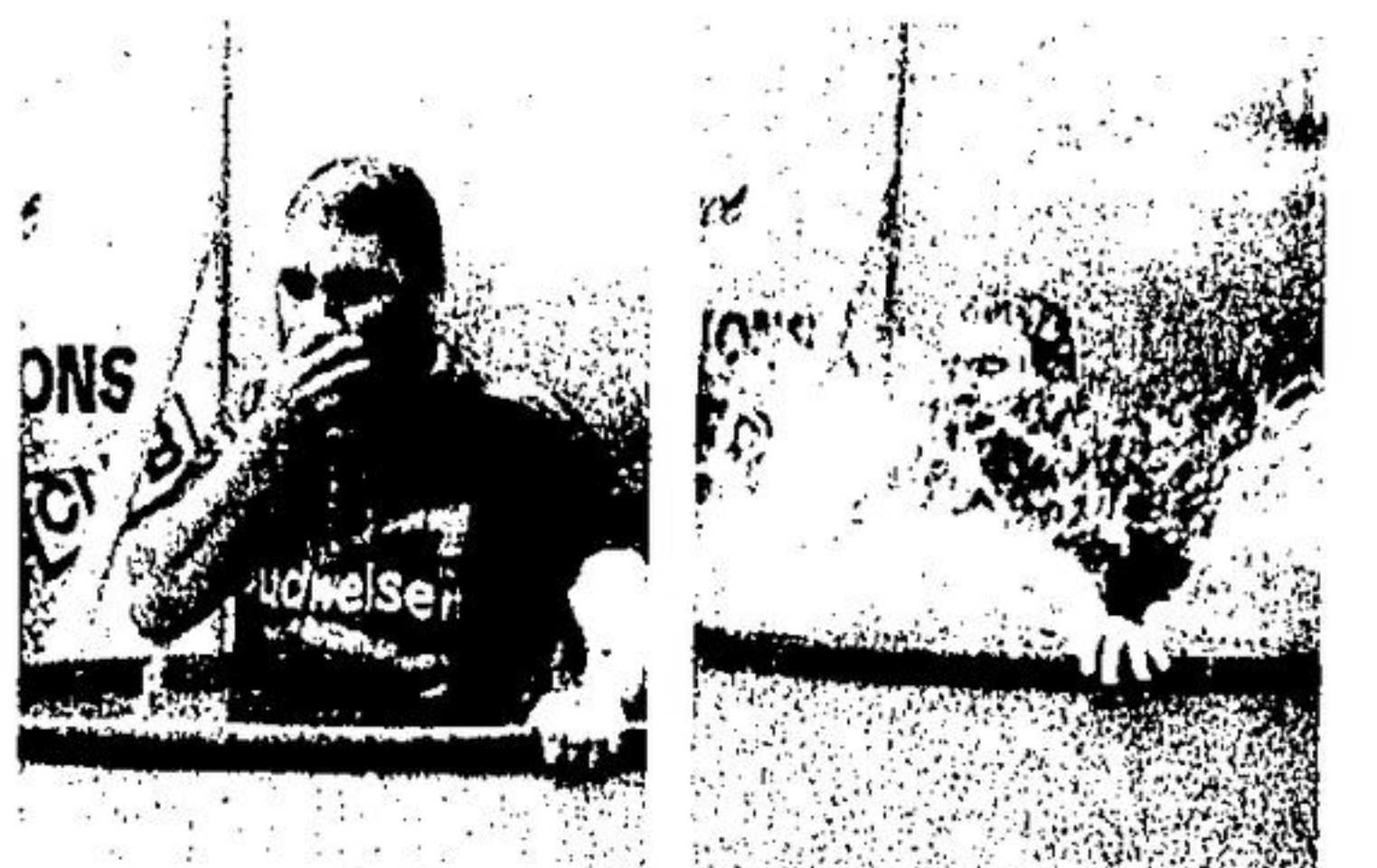
