CVCA wants 21% increase

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority's preliminary budget for 1988 calls for a 21 per cent increase over 1987.

The preliminary budget estimate for 1988 expenditures approved Sept. 25 totals over \$9,160,000.

Approximately 42 per cent of the estimates are for proposed capital projects which will require Provincial funding support, said CVCA General Manager Vicki Barron.

The Authority is asking for over \$3 million in provincial grants this year but the average transfer payment from the Ministry of Natural Resources is about \$1.5 million a year, Ms. Barron said.

The 21 per cent increase is just a preliminary figure and the actual increase is likely to be significantly lower, Ms. Barron said.

In order to get support for capital programs the CVCA needs the support of the province and member municipalities, Ms. Barron said.

"Never in our 30 odd year history have we ever got full provincial support for a preliminary budget," she said.

The Authority will have an indication of how much provincial funding is expected in October but final approval won't come until February, she said.

On the list of CVCA projects for 1988 is flood control work on Cooksville Creek with the Willow Park purchase in Norval following that on the list of priorities.

NORVAL - A special meeting of the Brampton West Women's Institute was held at the home of Isobel McKay Sept. 15 at 1:30 p.m. Mrs. McKay gave a very interesting summary of the North Bay convention which she had attended.

A definition of Women's Institute was given to the convention - "an educational organization for personal growth and community action."

Special guest was Mrs. Peggy Knapp, who had just returned from two weeks in Scandinavia, visiting with Institute members there. Her talk was most interesting. Among the highlights was one farm where they visited. It had been in the same family name since the 1400s. Institute Women in Scandinavian countries are extremely versed on Canada, she said. A social hour followed.

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"Qualified high school students are offered a unique opportunity to spend an academic year or summer holiday in Scandinavia, Germany, France, Switzerland, Britain, Holland, Spain, Australia, New Zealand or the United States as part of the ASSE International (ASSE) Student Exchange Program," announced Michelle Poisson, Canadian Director of ASSE.

"Until a few years ago, only a fortunate few could afford to spend a school year or summer abroad. Now, ASSE has changed all that," continued Poisson.

Students, 15 to 18 years old, qualify on the basis of academic performance, character references, and a genuine desire to experience life abroad with a volunteer host family from Europe, Australia, New Zealand or the United States.

"ASSE families abroad are carefully screened to provide a caring environment in which students can learn the language and culture of their new host country," explained Poisson. Year students need not have learned a foreign language as they receive language and cultural instruction as part of the ASSE program.

ASSE students attend regular high school classes along with their new teenage friends. "ASSE exchange students learn by living the language and culture of their host country" added Poisson.

A Tasty Recipe

GREEN TOMATO MINCEMEAT

- 2 qts. green tomatoes, chopped
- 4 quarts water
- 1 quart apples, chopped
- 1/2 pound suet, chopped
- 6 cups brown sugar
- 1 pound raisins
- 1/2 pound mixed peel
- 1 cup vinegar
- salt
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. cloves
- 1 tsp. nutmeg

Add water to chopped tomatoes. Boil gently for one hour. Let stand overnight; drain. Add next six ingredients and salt to taste. Mix well, then boil gently for 2 hours. Stir in spices. Pour into sterilized jars and seal.
