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

Art of juggling gains popularity

Although most people thing the art of juggling is confined to circus acts, it appears more and more enthusiasts are taking up the pasttime as a means of enjoyment.

Next Friday, Oct. 23, Franklin Hargraves of the Kingston area, makes a return visit to Halton Hills to conduct a juggling workshop at Harrison Public School.

Hargraves, or Freewheelin' Franklin, as he's known in entertainment circles took up juggling on a whim, but today it has become a big part of his life.

When he was here in March, Hargraves imparted some of his knowledge to a group of about 15 participants. He introduced them to juggling with scarves, as a means of establishing their timing. From there, many were able to move along to bean bags, rubber balls, and even clubs eventually.

Aside from being an astute juggler, Hargraves is also a professional clown, and performs mime, as well. Another part of the workshop will deal with balloon sculpturing.


The workshop next Friday at Harrison School runs from 7-8 p.m.



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
