Runners from Stewarttown Public School turned in impressive performances as they competed at the North Halton Cross Country Meet, held Thursday at Bronte Creek.

David Osborne won the Intermediate Boys' race and led his team to the Intermediate team championship. Aside from Osborne's first place finish, Randy Bond had an impressive third place finish, Charlie Snook was eighth, and Benji Murray was 11th. The Intermediate division includes runners who are 12-years-old.

In the Bantam Boys' division, for 10-year-olds, Dwayne Balanyk was 15th for Stewarttown, while William McEvean finished 54th.

In Junior Boys' competition for 11-year-olds, Paul Ingram led the Stewarttown contingent with a 22nd place finish, Matthew Medland was 4th, Terry Harnden was 59th, and Colin Graham was 64th.

In Senior Boys' competition, for 13-year-olds, Grant Bowler was the top Stewarttown runner with an 11th place finish. He was followed by team mates Ronnie Redwood at 15th, Dean Campbell at 20th, and David Campbell right behind him at 21st.

In the Girls' categories, Stewarttown also did extremely well. In Junior competition, Jody Johnson came third, while team mate Karen Pettipfer was 15th. Other members of the Junior team were Nicole Enge, who was 24th, and Seema Singh, who was 27th.

In the Intermediate Division, Kris-

Johnson came through with a second-place finish to lead her team. Other Intermediate runners included Teresa McFadden, who was 14th, Monique VanAltena at 17th, and Angel Hughes at 19th.

In the Senior girls' event Jennifer Eccles represented Stewarttown well, as she finished a creditable 13th in the division.

Atoms pull for gold

The Georgetown Minor Atom hockey team was in Don Mills during the Thanksgiving weekend to take part in a variety of events.

In the hockey portion of the MTHL Centre Tournament the locals played three games.

In their opener, Georgetown was doubled by Whitby 8-4 in what proved to be an exciting match-up. Scoring for Georgetown were Timmy Diardichuk, Brad Spears, Paul Sandifer, and Marc Boucher. David Boere, Scott Truman, and Scott Lahey picked up assists in the game.

Georgetown's second game was against Newmarket, who eventually went on to become division champions. The locals came up with a never-say-die effort.

Newmarket took the early lead, but Georgetown's David Kotsos replied to tie the game at one.

Newmarket then scored four consecutive goals to silence the Georgetown fans. But the Georgetown squad continued to battle back with a late period tally to set the stage for an exciting third period.

Spears scored a pair of goals in the final frame, both from Boere to make it close, but the game ended in a 6-4 decision for Newmarket.

Early the following morning, Georgetown faced off against Richmond Hill, who had to win to advance in the tournament.

Going into the contest undefeated, it appeared the Richmond Hill team underestimated Georgetown.

After the first period, the score was 2-1 in Georgetown's favor on goals by Truman from Spears, and Paul Sandifer from Truman.

By the end of the second period, it was 4-2 for the locals as they used solid positional play, pinpoint pass-

ing, and hard work to outdo their opponents.

Tallying for the black and red were Kotsos from Sandifer and Sandifer from David Kalbarski. The final scoring play was from Davidson to Kotsos, who fed Spears for the winner, making his final 5-4 in Georgetown's favor.

Finishing third in their division, just a half point out of second, was an impressive effort for an early season tournament.

But the competitive spirit of the Georgetown team didn't have to go to waste as they took part in an Olympic challenge and emerged with the gold medals.

Placing in the top 10 for fastest skating, hardest shot, and fastest skating goalie, they also entered the team tug-of-war contest.

The Georgetown team dispersed two teams to advance to the finals. At centre ice with hundreds of spectators looking on, the final tug-of-war challenge was a best-of-five pulls.

It took them only three pulls to defeat Thornhill, and they were greeted with thunderous applause as they copped the gold.

Medals, hats, and crests were presented to the Georgetown squad of Heinz, Lumb, Hewitt, Lahey, Boucher, Diardichuk, Sandifer, Davidson, Thom, Spears, Kotsos, Boere, Truman, Pearson, and Kalbarski, and all deserve congratulations for showing terrific team work.
