The closest World Series becomes the 1915 match-up between the American League's Boston Red Sox and the National League's Philadelphia Phillies.

The Red Sox won the '15 Series in just five games, but only one of those contests was decided by as many as two runs. Thus, the average run differential was 1.2, the lowest in World Series history.

That was to be the only Phillies victory in the 1915 Series.

The start of the second game was highlighted by President Woodrow Wilson throwing out the first ball - it was the first Series game ever attended by a U.S. chief executive.

Boston scored a run in the first inning, and the Phils tled the game in the fifth. Red Sox pitcher Rube Foster took matters into his own hands in the top of the ninth, driving in the winning run with a single. Boston triumphed 2-

With the Series moving to Boston, the Red Sox took Games 3 and 4 by identical 2-1 margins.

Lewis' RBI hit in the ninth defeated Alexander the Great in Game 3, with Dutch Leonard getting credit for Boston's victory. The next day, Ernic Shore of the Red Sox triumphed after losing his bid for a shutout in the eighth inning.

The Series returned to Philadelphia for Game 5.

Boston won the highest-scoring game of that Fall Classic, 5-4. Down 4-2, the Red Sox came up with two runs in the eighth to tle the contest. They won in the ninth on Hooper's second home run of the day.

When all was said and done, the deciding run had scored in the winning team's final time at bat four times in the five games in the 1915 Series.


