This the first in a series of columns to be brought to you by the Drug Abuse Committee (D.A.C.), community funded volunteer group servicing the communittee's needs in the area of drug education and professional counselling services. D.A.C. was responsible for the establishment and running of the CHICKEN club here in Georgetown which has recently been taken over by the Optomist club as an ongoing service project.

D.A.C. has also over the last six years, sponsored numerous other community awareness programs and handled hundreds of enquiries for drug related information and assistance. In our professional counselling area we have helped over 30 people, mostly youth under the age of 21, over the last two years.

D.A.C. is located in the Community Services Building at 164 Guelph Street Georgetown and is open to the public Mondays 6 p.m. p.m. Wednesdays/Fridays 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. The phone number is 877-0915.
