Morley Mills was 'Pioneer Citizen'

Morley Mills, a man who epitomiz- always had some interesting stories ed community spirit, passed away Oct.12 at the Credit Valley Hospital in Mississauga.

Mr. Mills, 77, was a ploneer in many ways.

In June he was awarded the Herald-sponsored Pioneer Citizen Award at the Pioneer Days celebration for his efforts in the community. Mr. Mills was one of the first Co-op

farmers in Ontario. He was involved in one of the first co-operative farms in the province located north of Kingston.

War veterans were anxious to start farming after the Second World War but they didn't have enough money for both livestock and

Seven familles, including Mr. Mills, pooled their resources on the Kingston farm with more than 900 acres and 500 rented acres.

Mr. Mills worked in the federal department of agriculture for 40 years with the dairy branch testing

milk. A resident of Georgetown since 1968. Mr. Mills has four children and five grandchildren. He and his wife Lauretta celebrated their 40th anniversary together in September

He retired from government job in 1971 and took on a variety of volunteer positions in Georgetown. Mr. Mills was one of the original board members at the community legal clinic and sat advisory board member with YMCA.

He and his wife wrote senior's column for five years for local newspapers.

Mr. Mills was an original board member of the housing co-op later

named after him. He was a presbytery representative for many years at the St.
Johns United Church. He was also one of the directors of the Bruce Cooperative Medical Services Board, a forerunner of OHIP. Mr. Mills

received a gold card and life membership in the New Democratic Party of Ontario from leader Bob Rae for his contributions to the party.



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


