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## Photo Tips

The final acquisitions in your darkroom odyssey are by far and away the most fun, however they are also the most expensive; mainly the enlarger. The enlarger is that wonderful mechanical/optical device that will enable you to take that tiny negative, (remember? your 35mm neg. is only 24mm x 36mm or 1" x 1 1/2") and hope you turn it into that eye catching 8 x 10, 5 x 7 or even an 11 x 14 print! Along with an enlarger you will also need an accurate timer for providing you with correct exposure times to the paper, and also to switch the safelight off and on when you are enlarging. You will also need an easel with which you can hold your paper flat while making your exposure; the easel (used price about \$20) also provides you with the 1/4" border around the perimeter of your print. Additional but handy extras, include a Focus Finder, an antistatic cloth, a can of air, a negative brush and a paper squeegee.

Now unless you can find a good deal on a used enlarger you might find the price on a new one terribly high. Quality modern enlargers range in price from \$400 to \$2000 and up, so for starting purposes a used one is the route to go.

The most important features to look for are a solid rigid frame, smooth focusing with no slippage, a good quality 50mm lens and a filter drawer. The filter drawer is of great use to you as you progress in your technical development and it will also aid in saving you some money down the line. Quality and yet basic enlargers on the used market range in price from about \$95 to \$275 and are unfortunately, scarce in outlying areas. Downtown Toronto usually has an abundant supply in the used category but you will have to make a days trip (or even several days) out of it in order to secure the best deal for yourself.

A good used timer can be obtained for approximately \$20 - \$45. I would suggest that you purchase a new focus finder so that you will have the full benefit of an unscratched one, it will make quite a difference for you. New - \$39.95 to \$125.

The anti static cloth, canned air, brush and squeegee should top off at another \$30 - \$40. As you can see by now the enlarging portion of darkroom work is considerably more expensive to set up than the previous stages. Realistically the enlarging portion should cost out at about \$225 to \$250 depending upon the deal you can find and remembering that we are looking at used gear. You will also have miscellaneous and various sundries to purchase mainly a few chemicals. Please keep in mind that once you have purchased the hardware you will only be restocking consumables!

Many photographers while learning are quite satisfied with the second stage of development - contact printing, as all you need is - paper, trays, a sheet of glass and a light source and you can print! Now once you have the set-up... "What do I do to get going?"

### Peewees 1-2-0

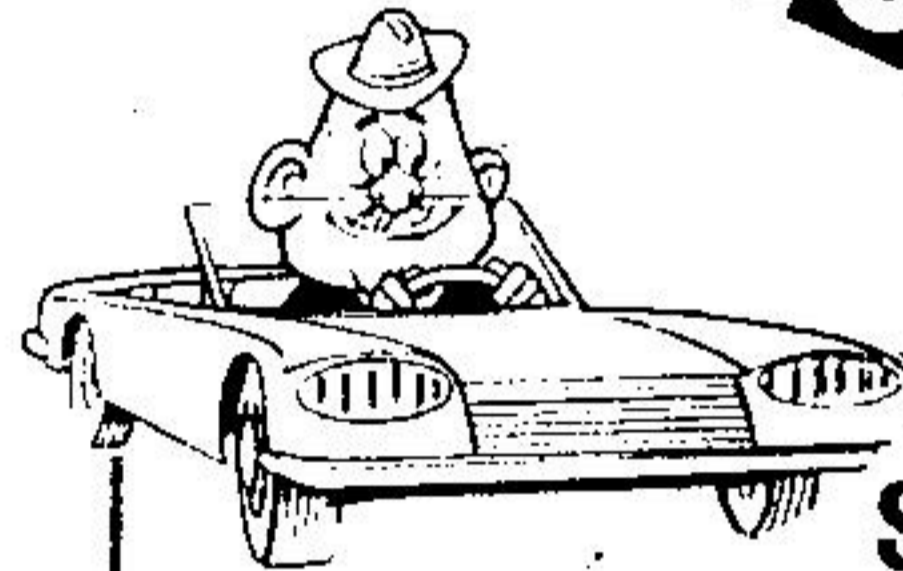

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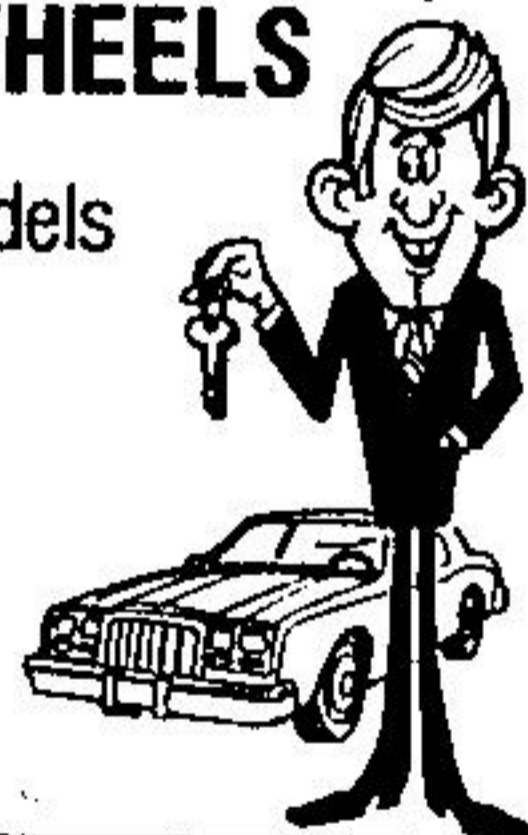


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
