Role as peacemaker

Dear Sir:

Some recent world events provide pin-points of light in the dark night of Peace. The stock market instability and widespread panic as real and paper fortunes collapse, has moved analysts to question the massive trade deficit of the U.S. and the apparent overspending of the Reagan Administration. With tax increases and belt tightening inevitable for most Americans, perhaps, the continued bank-rolling of the government of El Salvador and of the Contras in Nicaragua will be a thing of the past.

The signing of the Arias peace accord by the leaders of Guatemala, Nicaragua, Costa Rica, El Salvador and Honduras was in itself, a light of great magnitude,...120 days, during which each country would seek to bring democracy and peace to its peo-

pie,...120 days which foreign military aid would be, in the word of U.S. Senator Green, "inappropriate",...120 days to set the stage for real steps towards peace.

The awarding of the 1987 Nobel Peace prize to Costa Rican President Oscar Arias has high-lighted the fledging Central American agreement, giving it world recogni-tion. It has added pressure on our own foreign policymakers to address the threat of U.S. Congress allocating a further \$270 million for the Contras after the November 7 ceasefire deadline. Canada can play a major role in helping the peace dialogue and process in these wartorn countries become a Milky Way and not just a falling star.

But they also voted to allow a \$5 discount on the price of a dog license if the owner gets the license on or before Feb. 15 of each year. Councillors added another dis-


count on Monday. Senior citizens will only have to pay \$10 for a dog license thanks to a motion introduced by Councillor

Points on board hearing

Dear Sir: Having attended the Ontario Hospital Appeals Board Hearing and read your reporting on the events of the second day of testimony in the hearing regarding Dr. Ford, I feel that a few points should be made.

I do agree with your reporter that Dr. Ford's testimony was a main highlight of the hearing, particularly when he read from a patients file a portion of a letter enclosed with the coroner's report requesting that a copy of the letter and coroner's report be forwarded to Dr. Ford.

This letter was dated in March 1987. The first indication to Dr. Ford of the existence of this letter and the coroner's report occurred on the se-cond day of the hearing, SEVEN MONTHS after its writing. Perhaps the hospital should review its stafement, delivered at the Annual General Meeting in June, with the view towards revising it to reflect the true facts in the matter.

During the second day, there was testimony from the Secretary of the Medical Advisory Committee in 1986. This physician was a member of the M.A.C. for three years, from 1984 to 1986. This witness was crossexamined by Mr. Listwood, lawyer for the hospital. His statement to Mr. Listwood on being instructed NOT to prepare minutes of the meetings between Dr. Ford and the M.A.C. elicited shocked expressions from the members of the Hospital Appeals Board.

A compromise plan, prepared by this secretary of the M.A.C. was rejected out of hand, so he abstained from voting on the restriction of Dr. Ford's privileges in 1986. So much for the hospital's claim of unanimity of the M.A.C. regarding the restriction of privileges.

There was testimony supporting Dr. Ford from a surgical Nurse and a Nursing Supervisor. The vigorous cross-examination by Mr. Listwood brought a rebuke from the chairman of the Board, as did various attempts by this lawyer to, as stated by one physician on the witness stand, "put words in his mouth".

The hearing resumes on December 7, 1987. I can only hope that the outcome of this hearing which resulted from the harrasement by some 'instant specialists' will be beneficial to the citizens of Georgelown and area.

The recent resignations of the Assistant Administrator of the Hospital, the Administrator of the Bennett Health Care Centre, the Director of Nursing, and other staff members of the hospital do not indicate any improvements, and the oppressive silence of the Administrator and Board of Directors of the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital speak volumes of their unwillingness to countenance dissent and respond to the real and ongoing needs of our community.




