AT THE MOVIES

The Untouchables

The Untouchables is Brian de Palma's latest film, a reworking of the old television series. I never did see the series, so I can not make any comparisons. The film takes us back to 1930 Chicago, the heyday of Al Capone. Elliot Ness, Treasury agent, comes to Chicago to clean up the city and put Capone away. Together with his handpicked trio of men, Ness and company become the Untouchables, officers who can not be bribed.

The film is highly stylistic, evoking old Chicago in all its glory and decadence. It is also very violent; often it is difficult to watch. The blood flows more freely than the liquor, the root of all evil in Prohibition days.

One particularly sickening scene has Capone finishing an after-dinner speech to his cronies by taking a baseball bat and beating a man to death at the dinner table. Now that would give anyone indigestion. I did not do a body count, but I think it was pretty high. And very, very messy.

We all know that Capone will end up in jail on tax evasion charges; the suspense comes from waiting to see which characters will be killed. And killed they will be, there's no doubt about it; it would take miracles to save these men.

Kevin Costner is Ness, a straight-shooter and a family man. Costner is very convincing as the man driven to murder by the violence of Capone and his associates. Sean Connery is James Malone, an Irish cop who takes Ness under his wing and tutors him in the fine art of law enforcement. Connery is very good, although his accent is a little suspicious at times. Charles Martin Smith is an accountant from Washington who joins Ness and becomes a gun-toting crusader. He is the one who realizes that Capone can be jailed for tax evasion. Smith is great as the undersized, accountant playing cops and robbers. Andy Garcia is George Stone, the last member of the quartet, a sure shot rookie with slick hair.

The movie belongs to Robert De Niro though. His Capone is so vile, so violent, so arrogant; by the end of the film it almost made me sick to look at him. De Niro gained weight and shaved hair to look convincing. And he is convincing; one forgets all his other roles; he is Capone, inside and out. The fun-loving gangster who loves to do his own P.R. work with the Chicago press, joking about violence as if he had never even killed a fly, becomes a monster in the next scene, a man so cruel and so corrupt that he exudes evil. You can almost smell it. Capone thinks he is beyond the law; he has everyone, from the cop on the beat to the mayor, on his payroll. He is astoundingly arrogant; he would try to bribe St. Peter at the gate and he would expect to get into heaven by this. He would have no doubts. There is no glamour in this portrait; there is charm, but it is superficial and sickening, and becomes more revolting as the movie goes on. This performance alone makes the movie worth watching.

I think this is a very good film, although I did not really like it because it was so violent and it made me very tense. But as I have said, the acting is good and De Niro is brilliant. If you have a strong stomach, you will probably enjoy the film, if not, stay away. This is definitely not a movie for the kids.
