Sturgeon ponders defensive woes

# Time for Gemsto get 'ugly in our end'

Georgetown Gemini coach Peter Sturgeon now has a clear goal in mind if his team is to turn its for-

tunes around this year. The defensive unit must shut down the opponents attack.

The Gems scored 19 goals in three despite the loss. games this week but couldn't salvage a point from the three con- basaid.
