### Television program explains CAS role

Many myths surrounding child abuse have been peeled away by the media in recent years.

misconceptions, Numerous however, continue to exist about the agency responsible for intervening in troubled Halton families and helping the children who are in need of protection.

In an attempt to broaden public awareness and understanding of the role the Halton Children's Aid Society plays in the community, a new television program is being launched this fall by Oakville/Burlington Cablenet. Viewers in Milton, Georgetown and Acton will be able to watch the program on the Halton Cable Systems channel.

Entitled "CAS Cares", the monthly half-hour program will focus on the structure of the agency and the many individuals who work behind the scenes and on the front lines to carry out the agency's CARE Philosophy, (CARE stands for "Children and Adolescents, Reunification and Emancipation.")

The first program in the Halton CAS series, to be aired in late October or early November, features an overview of the angency. Subsequent programs will examine issues ranging from foster parenting to adoptions to some of the agency's innovative child abuse prevention programs - including those related to sexual abuse.

The program will afford viewers a unique opportunity to see interviews with perosnalitles ranging from Halton CAS Executive Director Ron Coupland and Cas Board President Edith Hopkins to in-depth discussions with social workers, foster and adoptives families, agency volunteers and program leaders.


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### Post-polio meeting


### Literary talk

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
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
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
