## Service prevents car garage horror stories

Everyone's got a horror story to tell about their car and a garage mechanic. Everything's been checked, the vehicle still stalls and you're ready to give up driving altogether.

Two enterprising men have come up with a solution for drivers who, as they say, "have become frustrated with the auto business."

Bill Taylor and Kevin Frank are co-owners of Canadian Automotive Service Club. Here's how it works.

For a membership cost of \$29.95, people are offered over \$300 worth of automobile services.

After going to the garage for five free service items, then the member will receive a free oil, lube and filter. After 10 free services he will be en-

titled to a free front end alignment. In all, there are over \$200 worth of free services, plus \$80 in free bonuses, plus over \$65 in discount services.

That doesn't even include a onetime 10 per cent discount on parts and labour for a member for additional work done.

Firestone is the only garage in the area associated with Canadian Automotive Service Club. There is only one garage representative per

as a test market for Firestone and may be eventually picked up by all its dealers.

The two entrepreneurs are "very exuberant" about their new car care concept. "People come back because they know they have a mechanic they can trust," the partners say.

You can't lose, says Kevin Frank. If you're not treated right you can walk away, but still receive the money value, he says.

The men started the business after talking to car owners who were frustrated. Many ask where is the best place to get their car fixed that had a reliable mechanic.

"The biggest problem (people have) is reliability," said Mr. Franks.

People want to drop off their car and know the work has been done to fix the problem and nothing else -there is a trust factor, he said.

The services offered by the Canadian Automotive Service Club are of a type that people generally neglect but they still need to be done to ensure proper handling and maintenance.

Kevin Frank, 23, has a sales background while Bill Taylor, 26, has been involved in advertising for weekly and daily newspapers.

### **Public Information Centre No. 2** Glen Williams Flood Control Project

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority has initiated a flood control study to identify flooding potential through the Village of Glen Williams. The study will recommend flood protection of private property susceptible to flooding based on economic, environmental, aesthetic and social factors.

The initial Public Information Centre was held June 25th, 1987 to identify preliminary concerns of residents. This session will deal with review of the recommended flood control alternative as it relates to individual property owners.
