

Sabres show signs of being contender after near demise

After facing the possibility of disbanding during the off-season, the Acton Sabres have bounced back and climbed to a prominent position in the Mid-Ontario Junior C Hockey League standings.

With two victories on the weekend, the Sabres boosted their record to five wins against four losses on the season.

At Grand Valley Thursday Rob Wilson scored twice as Acton doubled the Harvesters 4-2, and Friday they downed Schomberg 8-1, aided by the four-goal performance of Tom Fisher.

The club has been climbing steadily in the standings after getting off to a somewhat shaky start, mainly due to the fact that they were without ice for practice time until mid-October.

During the summer, there was a big question as to whether the Sabres would be back for another season, at all. But a new executive was formed and things are beginning to gel for the club both on and off the ice.

Jules Russiani has taken over as General Manager with the Sabres, and says the team is showing marked improvement since they've been able to book practice times.

"We've had three practices, and it's sure made a difference," Russiani says. "We're maintaining control, and not giving the puck away. The team's really come along."

Scoring goals doesn't appear to be much of a problem for the Sabres, and last week they acquired goalie Alec Piazza of Milton, which will

take some of the pressure off senior puckstopper Tom Hill, who has been carrying the weight in net for the team.

Piazza could get his first start with the Sabres this Friday when they play in Orangeville. "We figured we'd give him a chance to start an away game so he can get oriented to the team," Russiani says.

Gary Hudson is coaching the Sabres, after spending last season as skipper of the Georgetown Jr. B Gemini.

To this point in the season, Russiani says fan support in Acton has been encouraging, and he expects there will be considerable improvement as the team progresses.

"I think the fans are feeling us out right now," he says. "Once they see we have a contender, they'll come out more."

To this point, the Sabres have beaten every other team in the league, except Orangeville and Caledon. They lost to Orangeville 8-4 in Acton, but the game was tied at four after the second period. Against Caledon, they were edged 8-7 in overtime.

Bradford, the cream of the crop in the Mid-Western loop last season, trounced the Sabres in the first meeting of the two clubs. But Acton made amends on home ice when they took an 8-6 decision in a rematch.

Besides the game in Orangeville Friday night, the Sabres host Bradford this weekend for an 8 p.m. game Saturday night at the Acton Arena.

Senior Rebels end season unbeaten; preparing to meet O-T in playoff

The Georgetown District High School Rebels capped off an undefeated regular season in Senior girls' basketball Monday, as they

shaded Acton High School 38-36 in Acton.

The Rebels finish the season with a record of 11 straight wins, and will

have home court advantage through the playoffs.

Georgetown coach Moe Leeking had hoped to get a running game going against Acton, feeling that with his team's potent scoring attack they would have the advantage in a high-scoring game. But Acton was able to slow the pace down and stay within striking distance of the Rebels.

Today (Wednesday) both teams head into the Halton East playoffs with home court advantage.

The Rebels host Oakville-Trafalgar in a 3:45 p.m. contest. O-T finished in eighth spot.

Acton will take on Milton District High School in another quarter-final match-up. Milton finished seventh.

"We beat them handily," she says. "But I imagine they'll come up with a number of changes on offence and defence to try and bring the score a little closer."

At the Junior level of competition, Orchard says it's difficult to count on consistency, and therefore, she's remaining cautious.

"Unfortunately, with junior basketball, it's very up and down. We're never sure what the kids will bring to the game."

With a win over Blakelock, the Rebels will most likely face M.M. Robinson in the next round, at Burlington.

The Junior Rebels are to tip off with Blakelock today (Wednesday) at GDHS following a playoff match-up between the Senior Rebels and Oakville-Trafalgar, which begins at 3:45 p.m.

Glen Williams Flood Control Project

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority has initiated a flood control study to identify flooding potential through the Village of Glen Williams. The study will recommend flood protection of private property susceptible to flooding based on economic, environmental, aesthetic and social factors.

The Initial Public Information Centre was held June 25th, 1987 to identify preliminary concerns of residents. This session will deal with review of the recommended flood control alternative as it relates to individual property owners.
