Fatal Attraction

This is a movie that should do as much for casual sex as AIDS has. I guarantee that no married person will ever try picking up a stranger again after seeing this movie. And singles will think twice about it, if they aren't cautious already. Fatal Attraction is a real edge-of-yourseat movie, with a terrifying climax. It is a movie that is hard on the nerves.

Michael Douglas is Dan Gallagher, a happily married man with a young daughter. Glenn Close is Alex Forest, a new business associate, a single woman living in NYC. They meet at a party and then meet again the next morning on business. There is a mutual attraction and Dan ends up spending the weekend with Alex while his wife is out of town. They have a very erotic and wild time, but by the morning Dan leaves for home and we know that Alex is not exactly stable. For the rest of the movie we get to see just how crazy she is. Homicidal psychopath is the term that comes to

Dan soon discovers that there is a high price to pay for a weekend's indulgence. At first there are phone calls to the office. After that it's calls at home, in the middle of the night. Alex simply escalates the harassment until Dan is driven to tell his wife everything. Not that this will stop Alex.

can go no further without spoiling the suspense. I'll just say it is a really scary ending. (We're talking valium and vodka to get you over it).

Fatal Attraction was directed by Adrian Lyne, the director who did 915 Weeks and Foxes. I think this is his most successful movie yet, at least at the box office. Lyne is good at capturing details that make up domestic life. He is also good at showing electricity and erotic attraction between people. The film is not perfect, however; it seems a little too slow

for the first hour. Things happen, but perhaps not quite fast enough. But he lets the tension build beautifully during the second hour, until we are biting our nails and holding our

I think this is an interesting movie because of the issues raised. How much is Dan responsible for? Alex keeps telling him that he only thought to satisfy himself, that he did not care about other people, including herself and his wife Beth. This is perhaps true, he was being selfish at the time, but can that justify the torments Alex put him through? Probably not, but then again he was playing Russian Roulette anyway, in terms of safe sex and avoiding AIDS. This film makes one think twice about instant gratification.

Michael Douglas is very convincing as the handsome lawyer, father, and husband who has it all until he loses control and sees his life fall apart. I felt badly for Dan, but I did feel that to a certain extent he really did bring it on himself, (I suspect that this film will arouse different responses from different sexes). Ann Archer is wonderful as his beautiful wife, understanding and loving, pushed to protect her family from the tormented Alex.

Glenn Close is pretty good as Alex, but not great. Somehow her performance was uneven, her slide into psychotic not quite smooth enough. Unlike Dennis Hopper in Blue Velvet or Robert De Niro in The Untouchables, Close never seems to slip completely into the character. She is terrifying, yes, but not altogether convincing . I was always oware of Close the actress rather than Alex the lunatic.

Fatal Attraction is flawed, but well worth seeing if you like suspense. And its message will hit home - make sure you practice safe sex on all counts; a mental illness can be as fatal as a sexuallytransmitted one.



has '87 leftover money

Halton Region expects to have a

\$1.2 million surplus from the 1987 Halton Commissioner of Finance said. Joe Rinaldo said the figure

represents a 2.9 per cent of the Region's . \$70 million 1987 taxsupported budget. Leftover money is not unusual at the end of the year, Mr. Rinaldo

The money is usually used to either defray future capital expenditures or reduce the impact of increases in the 1988 tax supported budget, Mr. Rinaldo sald.

About half of the excess or \$650,000 came from supplementary taxes by the area municipalities, Mr. Rinaldo

Any Increased assessment in Halton, in the form of new homes or businesses for example, can result in excess money from taxes, he said.

Because of the increased households in Halton in 1987 the Region expects an increased grant from the province of about \$150,000, sald Mr. Rinaldo.

The remainder of the excess is due mainly to savings from staff turnover and delayed program storts, sald Mr. Rinaldo.

Line two 9x5" loaf pans or two 8" tube pans with heavy waxed paper. Prepare fruits and nuts; dust with 14 cup of the flour. Stir remaining flour, salt, baking soda and spices together. Cream shortening and brown sugar together until flut-ty. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each. Add molasses; mix well. Blend in dry ingredients; fold in fruit and nut mixture. Fill prepared pans % full. Bake in a slow oven (300°) 2 hours or until done.
