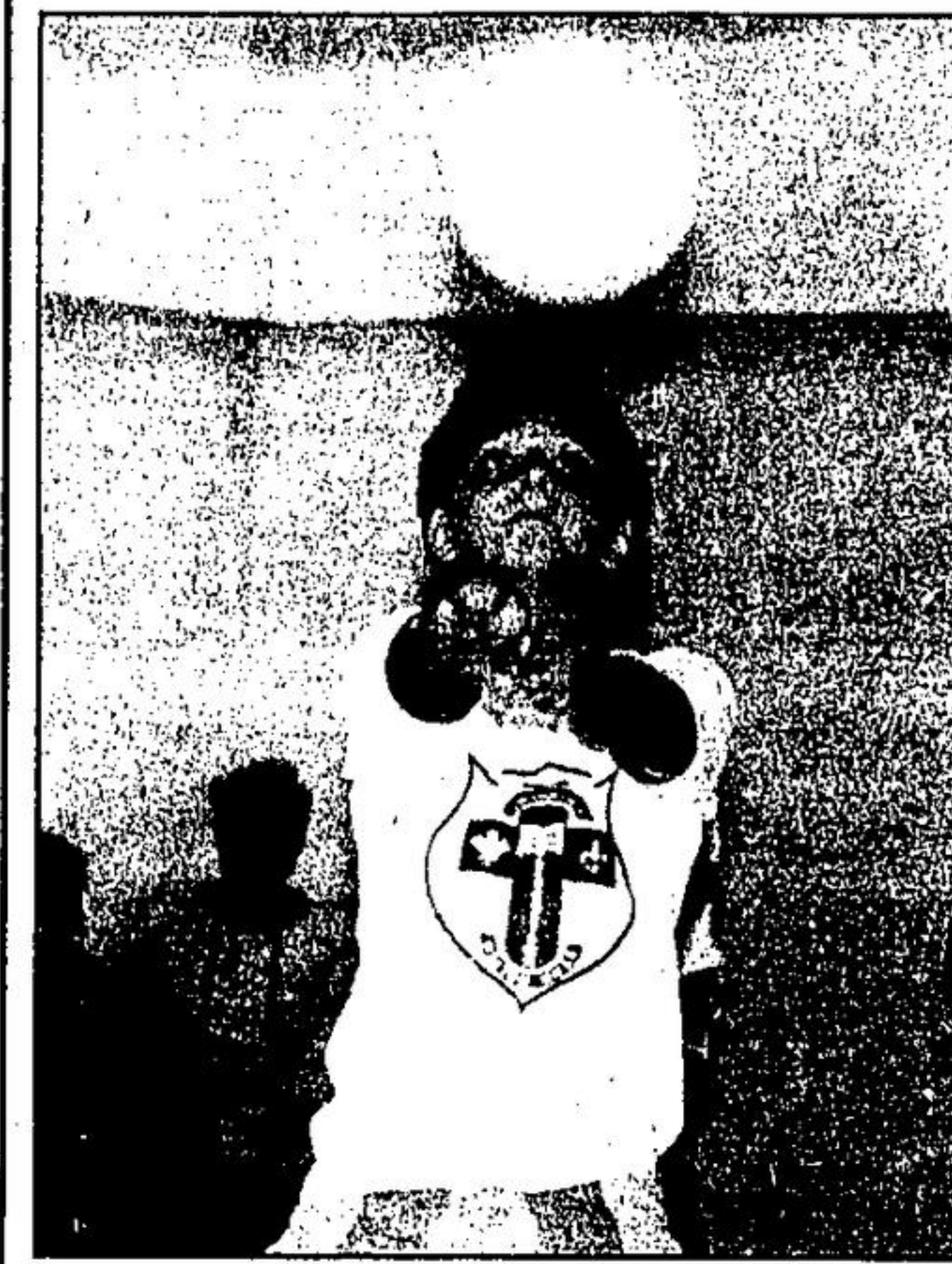

Gavin Glaser keyed the offensive attack with two goals, while Mike Bahr, Dave Bouskill, Blaine McCauley, Doug Sheppard, and Brent Wilkinson all added singles. Duane Erier and Sheppard each chipped in with a pair of assists, while McCauley, Wilkinson, and Stephen Onoprijenko had an assist apiece.

HALTON SAFETY COUNCIL
 Two (2) members who are residents of Halton Hills are needed to sit on this Region-wide Committee until December, 1988. The Committee deals with traffic, water, and family safety at monthly meetings.

ACTIVAN ADVISORY COMMITTEE
 Three (3) members are needed to serve on this Committee until December, 1990. The Committee meets three to four times per year to discuss activities and set policies for the Town Activan.

PROPERTY STANDARDS COMMITTEE

 Between six (6) and nine (9) residents of Halton Hills are needed to sit on this Advisory Committee of Council. The members will be appointed for 1, 2 and 3 year terms on a staggered basis. The Committee assists in the designation of buildings of historic interest under the Ontario Heritage Act.
