Tough road ahead

Sabres preparing to face 'acid test'

Herald Sports Editor With a pair of victories last week, the Acton Sabres upped their season's record to 10 wins against five losses, and at the same time improved their current hot streak to nine wins in their last 10 games.

Thursday, the Sabres rolled over Schomberg 5-1, and Friday on home ice, they dumped the Grand Valley Harvesters 11-6.

But for the Sabres, their "acid test" comes in the next four games as they make a legitimate bid for top spot in the Mid-Ontario Junior C Hockey League.

The four-game set begins tonight (Wednesday) with Acton hosting fourth-place Caledon Flyers, the only team the Sabres haven't been able to defeat this season.

Friday, Acton will host first-place Orangeville, while Sunday they pay a visit to Bradford, and Tuesday they take a trip to Caledon.

The Sabres' only defeat in their last 10 games was a 6-4 setback against the Flyers Nov. 11. But general manager Jules Russiani feels things will be different this time around.
